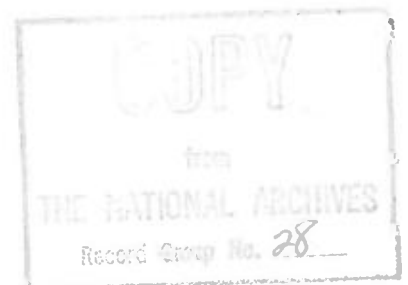
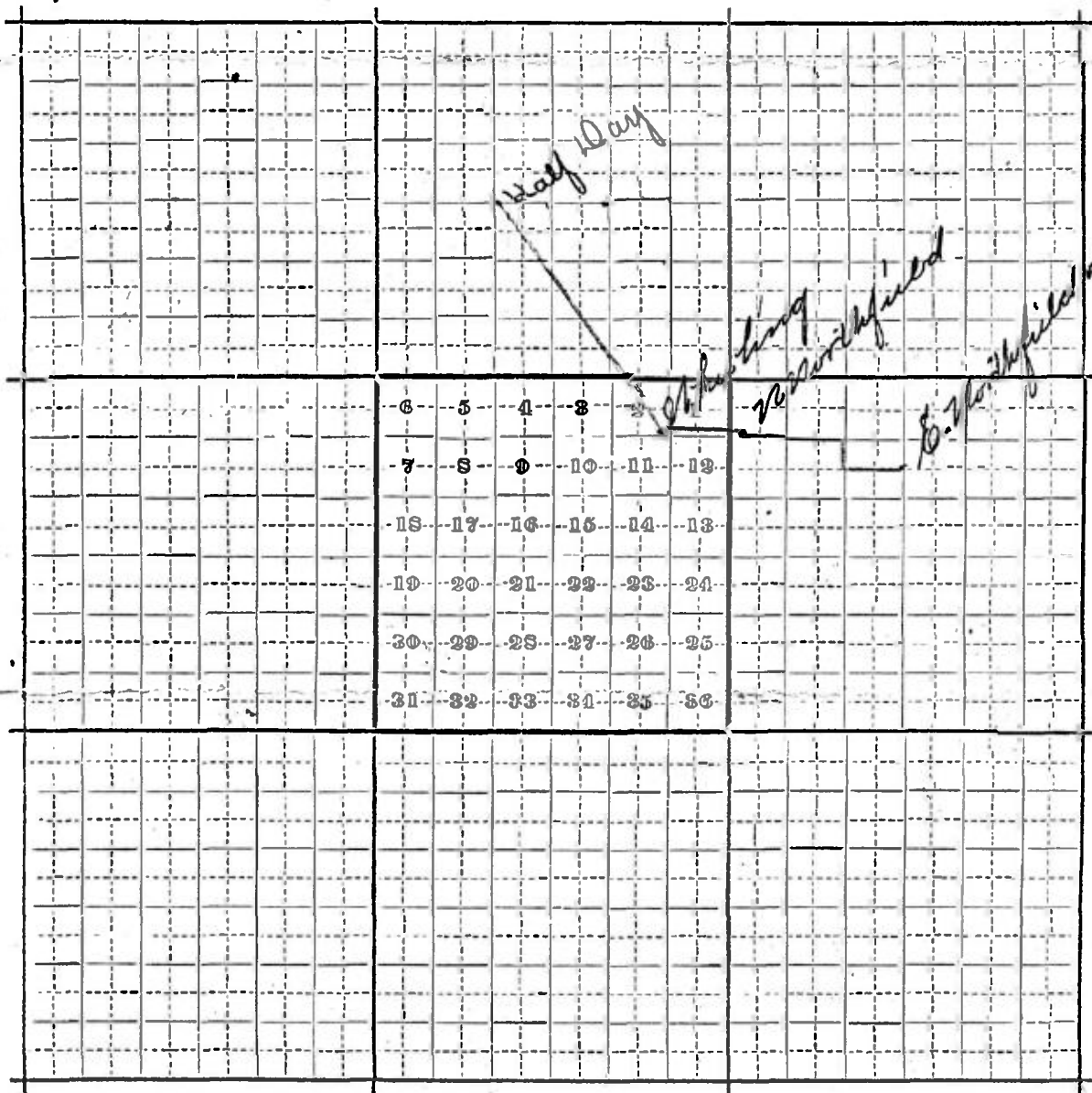


Diagram showing the site of the Whiting Post Office

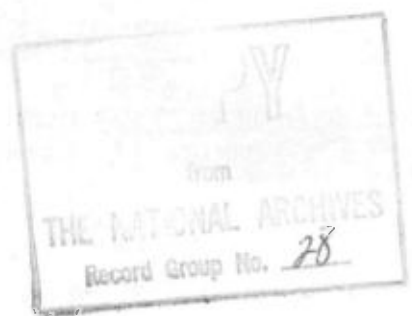

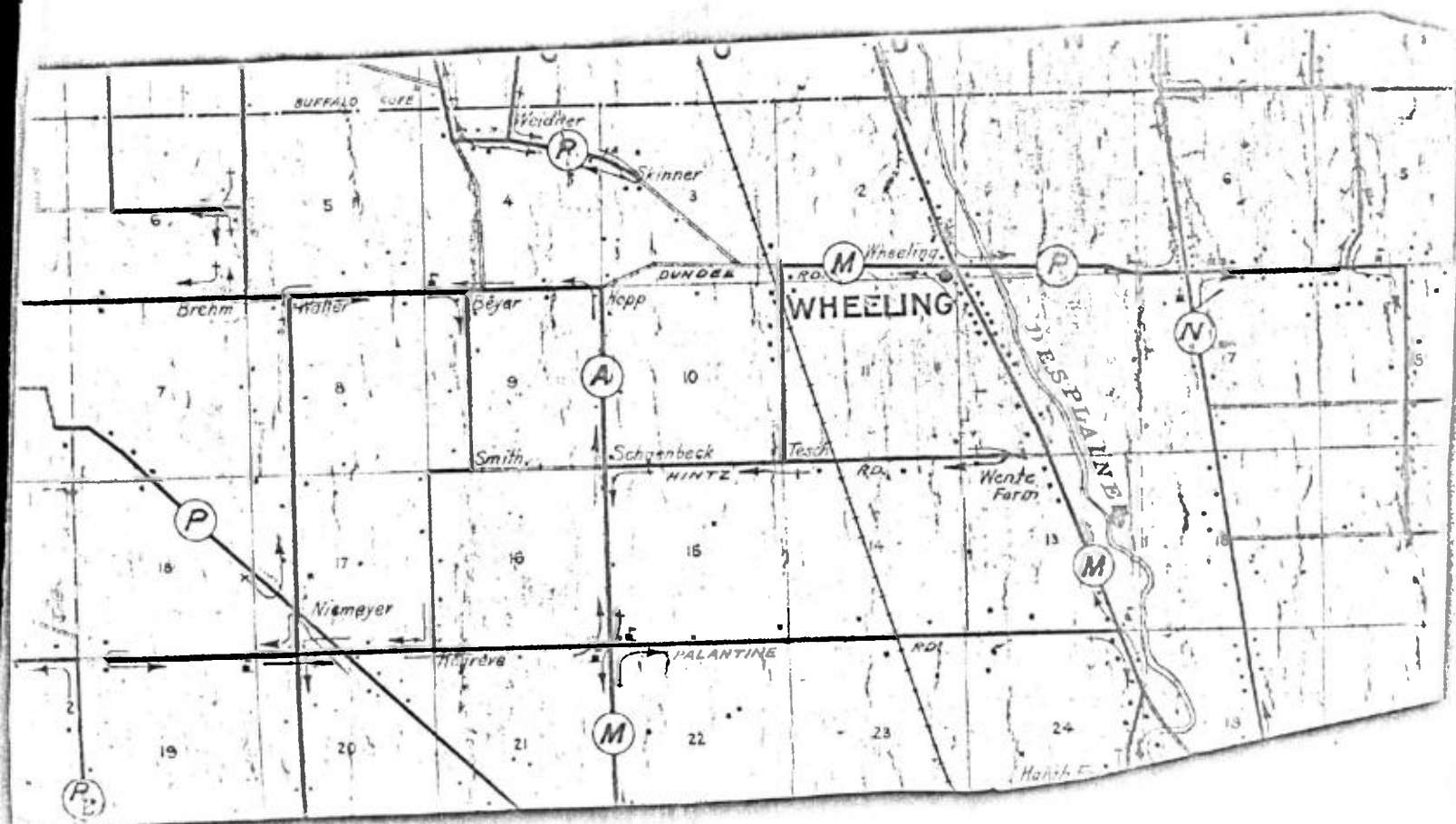

When, and moreover why, was this little settlement organized into a Village? The first official records were dated 1894. Necessary improvements were neglected, the regulation of dramshops (cocktail lounges) became more lax, foreign elements settled and engaged in occupation that neither enhanced the welfare of society nor improved its moral tone; citizens frequently suffered indignity and damage on their own premises from lawless strangers, and, withal the Village appeared to be in a process of general demoralization. In view of this state of things prominent citizens more urgently felt the need of Village organization. An election was held on June 19, 1894 with 43 votes cast for Village organization and 3 against. On July 17, 1894 the first Village officers were elected.

After having the first Village Organization Wheeling was still destitute and without protection from the so-called "lawless stranger". First monies received were from the dramshops for license fees of \$500.00 per annum. The problem of protection was solved by appointing a Marshall at a salary of \$15.00 per the first municipal year. The meeting place at this time was the Union Hotel.

In order to carry out the new Village ordinances it was necessary to measure the Village to get an accurate account of her size and shape. This was the next task undertaken by the Village Board. A committee was then formed to frame the ordinances against misdemeanors, nuisances and dogs. After completion, the ordinances were posted in prominent places

for all to see. The new government also made certain improvements in the city thoroughfares. It was soon plain to see that if one wanted to make his home in Wheeling he would have to be a law-abiding citizen.

With all of the business being handled by the Village Board, and with the need for a place for the custody of offenders, the need of a Village Hall became acute. On December 3, 1894, \$750.00 was appropriated for the Hall. (Interesting reading in paper of January 8, 1958.)

The control of contagious, infectious or pestilential disease in 1894 was a major problem. Ordinances of quarantine had to be written and enforced. Fines of from \$20.00 to \$100.00 were imposed on anyone who disregarded these ordinances. To further mitigate the threat of epidemic during the month of May a mass clean-up was ordered each year by the Village Board. Certain definite cleaning was required by the Village and in July the Village Marshall and Street Commissioner made an inspection tour and everyone failing to comply was prosecuted. (The plank sidewalks of the day presented several problems also as far as maintenance and repair required by the homeowner.)

The second year the Village Marshall received \$5.00 a month and after two successive appointments and resignations the salary was upped to \$25.00 a month and part of the duties were to take charge of the key to the Village Hall and light the street lamps. Later the duties were further expanded to include being Street Commissioner; the salary was increased to \$30.00

On April 6, 1896 the first move toward fire protection was made. After investigation on September 11, 1896 the bright new engine with all her trimmings arrived. Arriving also was a hook and ladder truck and other

equipment. The Fire Department in those days held an annual affair which was a picnic on July 4th; this was the start of the Wheeling Fire Department.

Bicycle racing was enthusiastically received in the 1880's. Wheeling residents were some of the first spectators as the cyclists zoomed through town on their cross country races from Half Day to Chicago. The first big event was held on Decoration Day 1896.

In the first years the whole Village could have been run on the taxes now paid by only six homeowners. In 1896 the total budget was \$1870.00. We had between fifty and sixty families at that time.

In 1900 permission was given to the Chicago Telephone Company to erect telephone lines along the streets and alleys for the purpose of public communication. They were to erect and maintain these lines for a period of fifty years. In exchange for this permission granted by the Village Board the telephones in the Village Hall and the Fire Barn were to be furnished free of charge. In December, 1901, the telephone service was ready but there were only two subscribers so that in March 1904 the exchange was discontinued. Four years later it was put back into operation through the Arlington Heights offices. In 1941 with a population of 550, there were 300 users, and by 1958 there were 3,138 users.

Milwaukee Avenue, at the turn of the century, was a dusty, narrow roadway, with grass growing in the middle. Yet, some say the Village was much more charming and picturesque in her early years. (Pictures in April 23, 1958 and May 7, 1958 editions.) Milwaukee Avenue looked like a country lane in the early 1900's instead of a four lane highway as now. Even before the days of the horseless carriage Milwaukee Avenue was the main route leading to Milwaukee, Wisconsin and points north - hence the

name. The Union Hotel was built to accommodate overnight travelers to Wisconsin cities. The original post-house was built in 1843, one of the first business places in the area. It's a great change, for in less than sixty years the street where occasionally a horse and buggy jogged along peacefully down the road, we now have a four lane highway for thousands of the "horseless carriages".

The May 21 and May 28, 1958 issues have some interesting personal letters to the Village Board - letters of about fifty or sixty years ago.

HISTORY OF ST. JOSEPH THE WORKER PARISH

On June 25, 1957 the late Cardinal Stritch appointed the Reverend George J. Mulcahey to form a new parish in Wheeling, Illinois. On August 4, six weeks later, the first Mass was held at the Chevy Chase Country Club. This was the Sunday place of worship until the opening of St. Joseph the Worker Church, at 181 W. Dundee Road, Wheeling, on Christmas Day, 1958.

The Reverend Raymond Nugent came to the parish on July 20, 1958, and was here until September 15, 1965, when he was succeeded by the Reverend Raymond Yadron.

The school, staffed by the Sisters of Mercy, opened on September 9, 1959.

The parish is named after St. Joseph the Carpenter, the husband of Mary, and the foster-father of Jesus Christ.

The church property was a farm of 24 acres purchased from the Buslow family on January 15, 1958. The farmhouse is the present Rectory. The church and an eight room school were built in 1958 and 1959. A four room addition to the school was constructed in 1961, and the convent in 1963.

Initiated by the Wheeling Jr. Woman's Club, a Historical Society Steering Committee was formed in June 1965. The Steering Committee consisted of 12 interested people in the community who wished to see a Historical Society formed. The purpose of such an organization is to be the discovery, preservation and dissemination of knowledge about the history of the community of Wheeling.

In July the constitution and by-laws were prepared and a nominating committee was appointed. On August 25, 1965 the group prepared to charter, the constitution and by-laws were adopted and the following officers were elected:

Thus was the beginning of Wheeling's newest organization to preserve its history.

IN GENERAL . . . The village of Wheeling is mentioned because of its extremely large population increase during the 1950's (682%), and its strategic location between the lake shore communities and the northwestern suburbs. Wheeling is involved in a trend towards the suburbanization of the northern farmland between these two sections. New residential areas plus 6 industrial centers are being rapidly expanded on the south and west sides of town. Original Wheeling (the group of frame small-town stores and homes at the intersection of Dundee Rd. and Milwaukee Ave.) has profited by the addition of a modern shopping center building and a new bank. New Wheeling is still under construction, with brick and combination buildings replacing more and more farmland each year. The Des Plaines River and its surrounding forest preserve forms the village's eastern boundary, and the small shops and older stores along Milwaukee Ave. cater to the patio, gardening, and eating needs of the nearby suburbanite trade.

HOUSING . . . In original Wheeling, 60-year-old frame homes stand adjacent to modern townhouses and large new apartment buildings, while outlying developments include frame and brick bungalows, split-levels, and ranch style homes. Home prices average in the 20's, and range up to \$35,000. New homes start at \$22,900. A number of builders are presently working in the area, and a substantial number of rental units have been added to the 215 reported in 1960. Rents are in the \$115

to \$175 per month bracket. There are some 40 townhouse units in Wheeling, a 170-acre planned development is being constructed southwest of town, and the Cameo Condominiums (for senior citizens) will soon have a total of 368 units.

SCHOOLS . . . Public: 7 elementary, 2 junior highs and the Wheeling High School are in the village. Pupil teacher ratio is 25:1, with \$440 spent annually per pupil. Parochial: 1 Catholic elementary.

CHURCHES . . . Baptist, Catholic, Episcopal and Presbyterian congregations meet in Wheeling.

TRANSPORTATION . . . Milwaukee Road trains stop in Northbrook, 4 miles east of town, and United Motor Coach buses reach the loop from the village in 80 minutes. Glenview buses serve local area needs, and the Dundee Rd. Edens Expressway entrance is 6 miles east of Wheeling. A Tri-State Tollway entrance is northeast of town on Deerfield Rd., and Pal-Waukee Airport is just south of the community.

SERVICES . . . Water from 5 wells is provided, garbage is picked up twice-weekly by private scavengers at competitive rates, and sewage is treated by the Metropolitan Sanitary District. The volunteer fire department has 32 members who work out of 2 stations, and the 23 full time police personnel are assisted by 11 "specials."

MEDICAL . . . Holy Family (236 beds) Lutheran General (324 beds) and Condell Memorial (77 beds) are hospitals in Des Plaines, Park Ridge, and Libertyville, respectively. In addition, there are 2 medical buildings and several professional offices with 16 doctors and 5 dentists in town.

SHOPPING . . . Old stores and a new shopping center building can be found in the main Wheeling shopping area at Milwaukee Ave. and Dundee Rd. The Dunhurst



Dunhurst Park-N-Shop, Dundee and Elmhurst Rds.

Park-and-Shop is also available on Route 83 on the west side of town. The Gaslight and South Point Shopping Centers serve the village, and there are several stores and service businesses along major streets. Excellent Randhurst Plaza is 3 miles south of town.

RECREATION . . . The Wheeling Park District manages an active little league schedule, a new fieldhouse (complete with gym), and lighted ball fields. There are playground facilities at the schools and in some of the subdivisions, and Chamber of Commerce Park has a winter skating area and a public swimming pool. In addition, some of the subdivisions and apartment buildings have their own pools, 8 golf and country clubs are within 5 miles of town, and Arlington Park Race Track is 4 miles southwest of Wheeling. Forest preserve facilities are plentiful along the Des Plaines River on the village's eastern boundary, there are several riding stables in the area, and 45 community organizations serve residents.

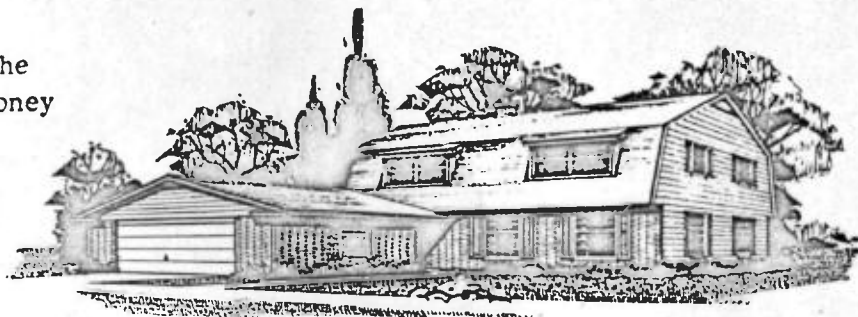

The Wheeling Community Council, as a project, is attempting to establish a network of nature trails or strip parks throughout the village.

Philosophy:

These trails would serve five main purposes which are as follows:

1. Complement existing parks
2. Provide off-highway access to our largest park site
3. Provide additional outdoor recreational facilities closer to our homes. Activities might include hiking, bicycling, canoeing, horseback riding, and camping.
4. Conserve some natural beauty in what is fast becoming a prairie of homes, sidewalks, and roads.
5. Preserve open space along the flood plane of Buffalo Creek

On December 2, 1965 the state of Illinois announced the states first comprehensive plan for outdoor recreation development. This report puts first priority, both at the state and local levels on land acquisition, and it emphasizes establishing nature areas and campgrounds within urban areas. They state "we believe the kinds of recreation people want most of all are relatively simple--a path to walk along".

Implementation:

The following are some approaches that might be taken to obtain this land for nature trails:

1. Owners of this land might be willing to donate or allow the village to develop this land. Property donated to the village for recreational use is tax deductible and owners cannot build on the land in the flood plane.
2. The state will provide up to 50% of the cost of purchasing land, should this be necessary.
3. Voluntary fund drives.
4. Cooperation between citizens, organizations and local government agencies would go a long way toward establishing this program.

Conclusion:

The need for the project described above would be difficult to measure in statistical terms but it is vitally important in meeting the needs people feel most -- the simple activities which lend contrast to, or give relief from, our complex way of life.

Time is rapidly running out for preserving open space in Wheeling and it is imperative we acquire the creek basin now while it is still almost entirely open.

"1966"

The widening of the Dundee Road extending from Milwaukee Avenue running West to Route #83 has finally reached completion this later part of the year. The Four-Lane driveway has met with welcome approval so the Citizens of the Village after much pleading for past years with the Highway Department for this very badly needed project.

Milwaukee Avenue and Dundee Road Crossroads at the corner of the South-west displays "The Wheeling Trust & Savings Bsnk". At the North-west a Gas Station, and the South-west on the Milwaukee Street facing west a structure with an old country store appearance known to be one of the oldest buildings in the Village today, and at the North-west a Gas Station also.

The Wheeling Cemetery known to be the only oldest in the Village has received a Brand New-Appaarence from the Street level with a Fancy Concrete Wall extending about 10 feet high from the ground and finished with an Iron Wrought Fencing Trim above the Wall. This camouflage hides the Head-Stones from view when walking or riding on the street.

The Old Bridge was removed over The Buffalo Creek west of Wolf Road and replaced with a Brand New Modern Bridge.

The Soo-Line Depot is still standing on the original Site west of the tracks alongside of south of Dundee Road.

The Dundee and #83 Route with also a widening at the Crossroad gives much ease for driving to the Mot rist. Our Dundee Road to the West about ten miles runs into The North-West Highway and further onto Barrington Road to the West.

SNOWSTORM

No more than snow cleared away for two days, when another storm appeared - but not so severe. People started walking to the stores for food instead of the convenient automobile driving. It looked like olden days of the past to see children and adults bundled up and walking to town. Snow piled very high. Despite on the Main Milwaukee Avenue going thru Wheeling the motorist kept plowing with their autos; as the State and County trucks with Snow plows tried to clear the Roads. It was a Long Hard Procedure to drive thru the Snow. People were stunned and felt pretty well Beat and Tired out from this Unusual Ordeal

This Infant Wheeling

by Joan Heuer

This is the story of the birth of Wheeling, Wheeling in dlapers, Wheeling taking her first stumbling steps, Wheeling trying to find her rightful place in that large, sometimes frightening world called proper society. This is the story of the men and women who nursed infant Wheeling and guided her unstable feet and hands through the years of childhood.

When, and moreover why, was this little settlement organized into a village? To find the answer we looked into the first official records of the village—dated 1894. We found the first meeting of the Board of

Trustees was held in the District Schoolhouse on July 26th of that year. The Introductory to the Record of Proceedings revealed the reasons for incorporating. It stated:

INTRODUCTORY

For several years prominent citizens of Wheeling had seriously considered the advantages and disadvantages of Village organization; but, as to many the disadvantages seemed to predominate, the organization was not attempted.

Circumstances, however, changed and changed public sentiment.

Necessary improvements were neglected; the regulation of dramshops

became more lax; foreign elements settled and engaged in occupation that neither enhanced the material welfare of society nor improved its moral tone; citizens frequently suffered indignity and damage on their own premises from lawless strangers, and, withal the Village appeared to be in a process of general demoralization. In view of this state of things prominent citizens of Wheeling renewed the agitation for Village organization with more hope of success. The most progressive businessmen of the Village took the leadership in this movement, arranged for a mass meeting early in the month of June, invited an attorney at law to speak to the people on Village organization. Accordingly the mass meeting was held in Union Hall; the merits of self government were explained; a plat, showing the territorial limits of the proposed incorporation was presented by the assessor of the Township; a petition, praying for Village incorporation, was prepared in due form, signed by 42 legal voters residing within in limits of the proposed incorporation, and addressed to Hon. Frank Scales, County Judge, Chicago, Ill. The County Judge took official notice of said petition, and the County Clerk ordered a special election to take place on the 19th day of June, 1894 in Union Hall, giving legal voters an opportunity of deciding for or against Village organization. The election was held on the date and in the place aforesaid with the following result: For Village organization under the general law 43 votes; Against Village organization under general law, 3 votes. The election returns having been duly canvassed the County Clerk ordered an election under the general election law to be held on the 17th day of July 1894 for the purpose of electing Village Officers, to wit:

One [1] President; Six [6] Trustees; One [1] Police Magistrate; One [1] Village Clerk.

Accordingly the election aforesaid was held with the following result:

President: Henry Boehmer; Board of Trustees; John Forke, Jacob Schwingel, Emil Sigwalt, Reinhold Schneider, Wm. Fassbinder, J. A. Schminke; Police Magistrate: Louis Fischer; Village Clerk: W. R. Mundhenke.

The votes having been canvassed and the organization papers entered in County Court of Cook Co., Ill. completing the organization of the Village of Wheeling, the officers duly qualified and entered upon their respective duties.

With the baby now born and in the arms of her proud and determined city fathers let's follow "The Infant Wheeling" through days of shaking decisions. 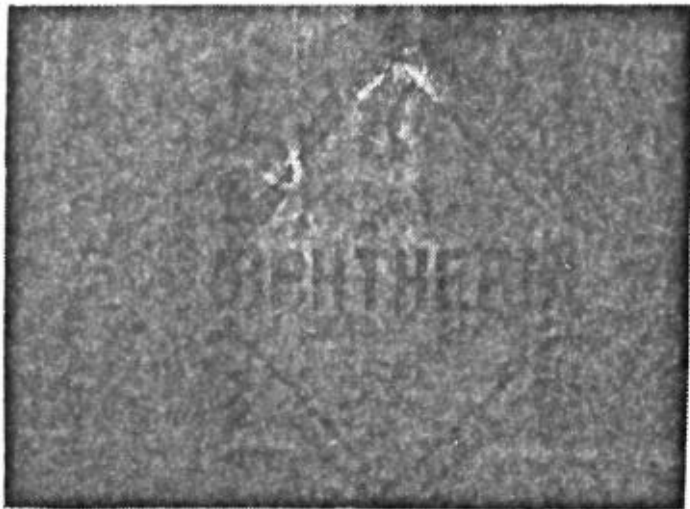

Wheeling Has Had Its Share Of Illnesses

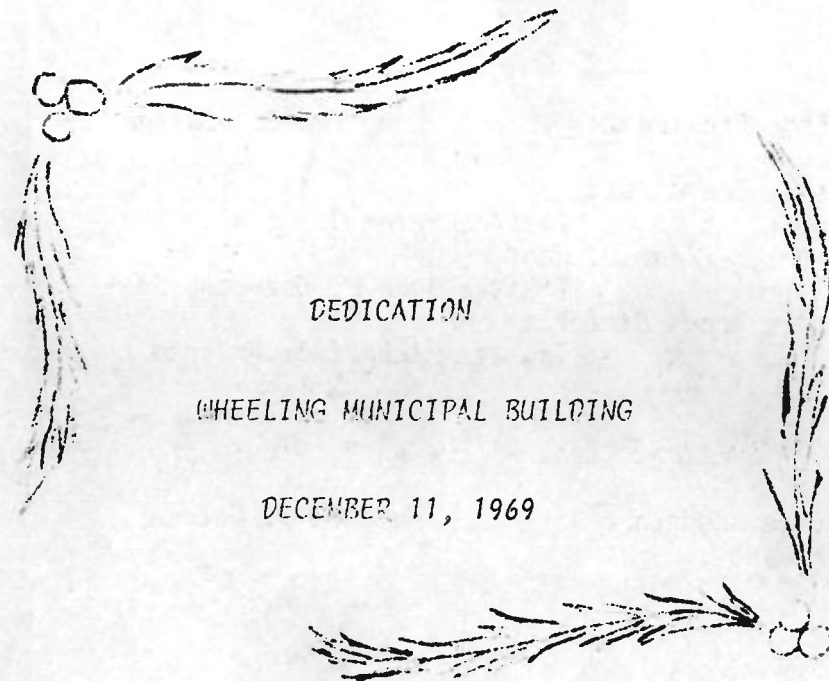


Dread diphtheria left its mark on the village at least twice in its history. Just before the turn of the century early settlers will tell you "Black" diphtheria surrounded the town and several gravestones marking tiny graves in the cemetery is all that is left of one family of children. During the 1930's diphtheria threatened again. In one family everyone was stricken and two deaths

resulted. Luckily inoculations were available then and community leaders took over the large task of immunizing residents. Well over half the town was brought to the Wheeling Public School and inoculated and more than one arm was carried around in a sling as a result. Undertaking this vast project was the Infant Welfare Society, under the direction of the County and Public Health Nurse, Myrtle Sorenson.

Gentlemen;

CHILDERLEY, in translation "children's meadow", by its past concern for and future potential to the welfare of children, has placed itself within the purview of the Youth Commission and stands squarely upon your sound judgement.

The early history of Childerley is almost entirely concerned with the welfare of disadvantaged children. The fathers were casualties of early industrialization, who in death, left these children semi-orphans. Mrs Francis Crane Lillie developed a small community for the widows and their children, initially as a personal responsibility which was later supported by the Crane (Co.) Endowment Fund.

The 32 acre section (of the 600 acre Crane Farm) which was originally designated to the orphan's welfare, is now known as Addolorata Villa. The name "Childerley" was later adopted for the 10 acre site, which itself had been donated to the religious welfare of the Lillie's fellow man. On this site stands Mrs Lillie's own historic preservation, a log cabin. Built about 1825, it was moved, repaired and developed into a chapel of retreat. Nearly 150 years old, it most certainly holds some of the secrets of man's earliest triumphs. His physical stamina, his ingenuity and his perseverance are all in evidence in the cabin, fashioned as it was from trees which the early settlers cut and shaped without benefit of mechanized equipment.

Preserving the physical structure, which contains the history of these early community settlers and of the woman who preserved their work, using it as she did in foundation for her own outstanding contributions to the welfare of others, is a privilege few communities have an opportunity to enjoy.

The Commission members feel the preservation must be a priority and should be designated for future Park District development which stipulates the future preservation of (at least) the log cabin if not all the buildings on the property.

We recognize the importance of the hospital tentatively proposed for this site as it relates to the physical well being of the community and its youth. However, we are convinced that Childerley holds equal importance as a physical example of the religious and humanitarian philosophy of the earlier era and its pioneers.

We respectfully suggest that a responsible decision cannot be made without first having full particulars of the amount of history contained in this site, the desperate need for strategically designated open areas and the dearth of historically significant landmarks for the benefit of our children, within our community.

A hospital can be built and conduct whatever humanitarian work it may do, almost anywhere. Childerley can only be retained by preserving it where it is.

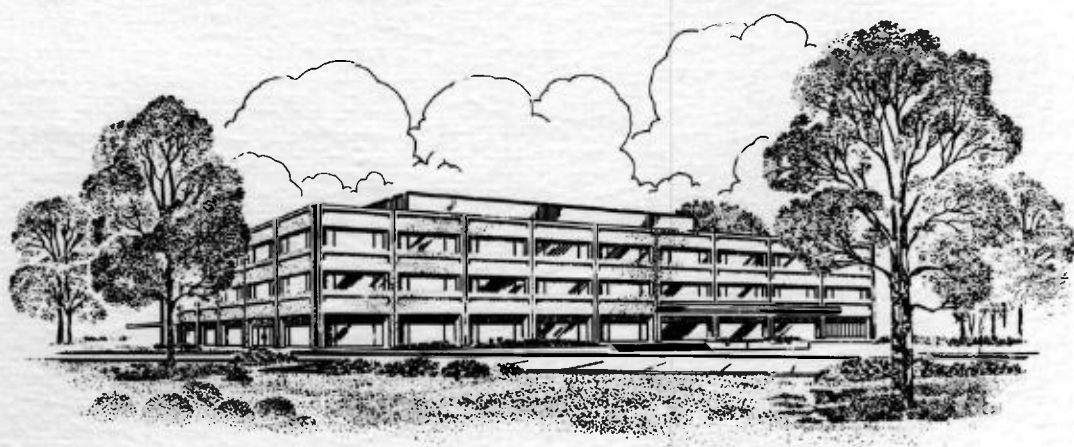

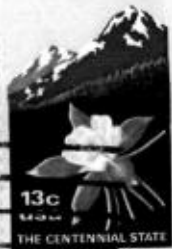

LAND PATENT was issued to George Strong by President John
 Tyler under Preemption Certificate No. 7597 on March 10,
 1843. This gave Strong all the rights normally transferred
 to the buyer when a piece of property is purchased today.

A similar series of events was required of each homesteader
 who came to Illinois, settled on a piece of land, built
 a house, and lived there for the required period of time.
 The records of George Strong's land purchase were obtained
 from the National Archives and Records Administration in

As this is intended to be a complete summary of all that pertains to your child's school life this year, it is hoped that you will regard it with more than a mere passing interest, and that you will co-operate with the teacher in securing the best possible results. The value of the Report Book will largely depend upon the interest shown in it by you. The pupil naturally looks for praise or censure, according as the record is good or bad. If good, an encouraging word should be spoken. On the other hand, if irregular attendance, low deportment, or neglected lessons be reported, the fact should not pass unnoticed.

Should you at any time discover anything of an unsatisfactory character through means of these reports or otherwise, it is earnestly desired that you will call upon and consult with the teacher at once. By pursuing this course, misunderstandings will be avoided, and the parties most interested in the welfare of the pupil will mutually assist each other.
