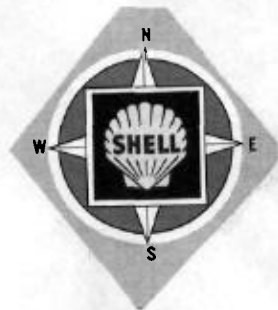

Wheeling Juniors Enter 2 National Contests

Wheeling Junior Woman's Club will submit entries in the General Federation of Women's Clubs Community Improvement Contest and also the Shell Oil Contest, both of which offer cash awards for outstanding work in community improvement and education.

Mrs. Raymond Olson, club president, announced that entries are being prepared now.

The community improvement competition is co-sponsored by the GFWC and the Sears-Roebuck Foundation. Its purpose is to provide incentive for federated women's clubs to join with other community forces in projects that meet the basic community needs and will have long-range results.

THE CONTEST covers a two-year period. At the end of this time, clubs report their community work in writing, usually in the form of an illustrated scrapbook. These reports are reviewed by persons of special professional skills, acting as judges, first at the state and then at the national level.

A total of \$80,000 in prizes is offered with the top award being \$10,000. Prize money must be spent to benefit the community.

The Wheeling Juniors have entered each contest since the club was organized. In the 1958-60 contest, the club won first in Illinois with a prize of

\$300 and sixth in the nation with an award of \$1,000.

IN 1960-62 the Juniors placed second in Illinois, receiving \$200, and in 1962-64, they received honorable mention.

The main project in this year's entry, according to Mrs. Julius Benjamin, community improvement chairman, will be the Scholarship Foundation. Other new projects to be reported are the village beautification committee, Christmas decoration for the village and the baby sitter clinic held last September and October. Continuing projects are the Historical Society, park district, candidates forum, library, Community Council, school caucus, scholarships for teachers of exceptional children and hostessing various village

events.

THE SHELL OIL contest, sponsored jointly by the GFWC and the Shell Oil Co., is for work in the field of education. Its aim is to encourage women's clubs to support their educational institutions and promote education. Judging is based on community need, cooperation with other organizations and manner in which the need is met.

A total of \$1,000 is awarded for state prizes and \$5,000 for national awards.

Wheeling Juniors were instrumental in starting a scholarship foundation at Wheeling High School. Their entry in the 1966-67 contest won first in Illinois with a cash award of \$500. This money was given the foundation.

1967 NATIONAL AWARD WINNING PROGRAMS



1ST PLACE NATIONAL AWARD—\$2,500

The Bethune (South Carolina) Woman's Club awarded the top national prize for its vocational training program for high school boys which also brought about a community center for their town of 583 people. The club acquired an abandoned grammar school building; donated \$6,000, which they had raised, to purchase supplies; and turned the building over to the local school vocational instructor. He used the facility to instruct his students in plumbing, painting, plastering, carpentry, electrical wiring, landscaping and other trades. The students received the adequate instruction and practical experience that had been lacking in their school courses, and the club women were able to present the community with a center for community meetings, social age activities and library facilities. All of the club's members took part in the project.

2ND PLACE NATIONAL AWARD—\$1,500

The Hallock (Minnesota) Study Club won its award for establishing a college scholarship fund to help students overcome financial and geographic obstacles characteristic of their remote farming community. With only \$40 in their treasury the 17-member club set to establish a scholarship fund for Hallock students already enrolled in college, vocational or technical schools. The club sponsored a community-wide variety party, an adult talent show, a pop concert and a book project, raising enough money to award the scholarships to students who would otherwise be forced to discontinue their higher education.

3RD PLACE NATIONAL AWARD—\$1,000

The Murray (Kentucky) Woman's Club received the award for a diversified program of assistance to kindergarten youngsters, music students and their community library. A total of \$4,000 was contributed to youth projects, the majority of which was raised with a musical dramatic production. Their most noteworthy project was the final payment of \$1,700 on a \$7,000 debt for the construction of a kindergarten room founded by the club nine years ago and supported by members at that time.

EXAMPLES OF OTHER OUTSTANDING STATE AWARD-WINNING PROGRAMS IN 1967

The Woman's Literary Union of Portland, Maine raised funds for the Blind Children's Resource Center, the only school of its type in the state. To raise funds for the purchase of Braille books, typewriters and other equipment for the center, the club scheduled an invitational food sale, appealing to 133 churches in the Greater Portland area to contribute or take part in the project. The club's 422 members donated baked goods or made contributions, arranged television, radio and newspaper publicity and conducted the sale, which netted over \$900 for equipment for the Center.

The Wheeling (Illinois) Junior Woman's Club won its award for initiating a community-wide effort that resulted in the formation of the Wheeling High School Community Scholarship Foundation. The club sponsored a "kickoff" meeting to stimulate community interest in a scholarship foundation and donated \$100 to start the fund. All 24 club members took part in the Foundation's fund-raising event, a community variety show which won the support of 28 civic and service groups in the area. This fund-raising activity raised a total of \$2,600 for the scholarship fund.

The Silver Spring (Maryland) Woman's Club established a project directed at the high school dropout and the young adult who has not completed his education and lacks the basic educational skills. Aroused by a study which showed that 4,000 young people (between the ages of 17 and 25) in their county were functionally illiterate, the club launched a program to aid the Adult Basic Education Program of the county. Club members served as teacher aids, financed field trips and newspaper subscriptions, school reference books and supplies. The club also awarded four college scholarships and worked with underprivileged children. Over 200 of the club's 227 members took part in these activities.

The Junior Woman's Club of Bloomfield, New Jersey conducted a program of volunteer service and financial aid to a school which provides education, diagnostic evaluation and treatment of children with emotional or neuropsychiatric disorders. Club members served as "teaching moms" taking part in a remedial tutoring program. To raise funds for the school, the 20-member club

One of the most important things that a community can have is a sense of common purpose. Trying to find a common bond to bring together long-time residents of our 130 year old village, which had a population of about 950 in 1954-55, and has over 12,000 today, requires rethinking, new thinking, and constant re-evaluation.

Our new high school provided the key. The community had developed a sense of pride in the school - its drill team, and its Presidential Band, which had won honors in the 1967 Aquatennial in Minnesota for the third year. Keeping this spirit alive could be the answer to village apathy.

Using the high school as a focal point was the beginning of village cooperation and communication. More than anything in Wheeling's history, the formation of the Wheeling High School Community Scholarship Foundation has drawn the village and surrounding community, which the high school serves, together to work for a common goal.

Participation in the Wheeling High School Community Scholarship Foundation's Variety Show, "Footlights to the Future II - Sounds of Suburbia", is a classic example of community cooperation. This year, fourteen groups, representing all phases of interest, not only from our village, but from the entire surrounding area which sends students to the high school, are working as one to make our second goal of scholarships for our students a reality.

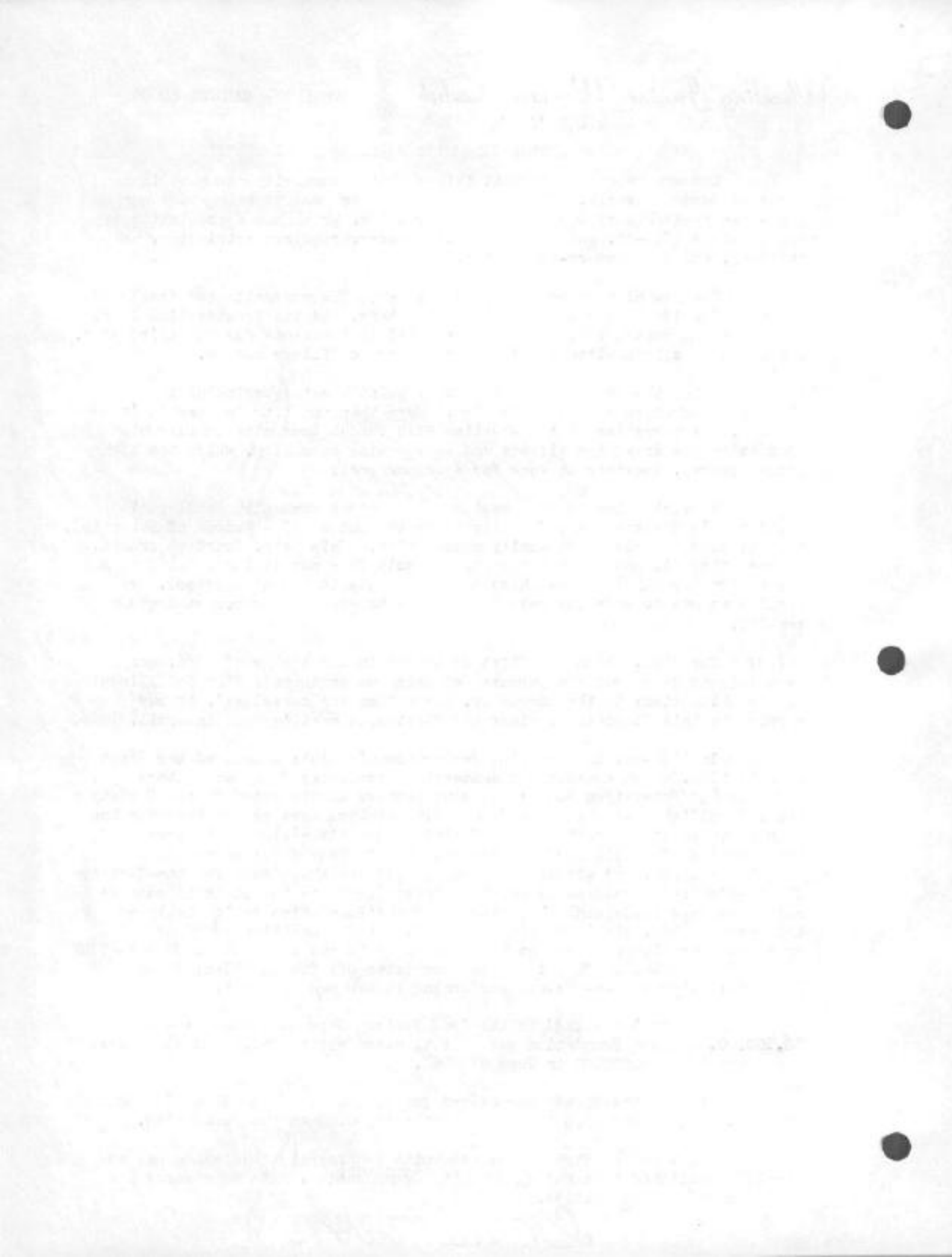
Our club, which was first organized in the spring of 1956, has been able to carry out the purpose for which we organized: "The fulfillment of our obligations to the community, the nation and ourselves", by our service to this Foundation, since the first open meeting held in April, 1966.

In 1966-67, the Wheeling Junior Woman's Club: sponsored the First Open Meeting, which established a Steering Committee; 2 of our members serve on the Foundation Board; all club members participated in the Variety Show, "Footlights to the Future"; all club members were responsible for the sale of at least 2 tickets to the Variety Show, via a club motion; secured the donation of a billboard to advertise the Variety Show; helped in securing ads for, and placing our own club ad the the adbook for the Variety Show; addressed envelopes to local business merchants to get their cooperation; radio coverage explaining the purposes of the Foundation and to ballyhoo the Variety Show, via interviews of the club and Foundation Board members by one of our club members who had a local radio show; and TOTAL COORDINATION OF THE VARIETY SHOW. This last item consisted of: Ticket Sales; Stage Managing; Ushers; Make-Up; and performing in our own club act.

The total realized by the 1967 Variety Show and adbook was about \$2,500.00, and the Foundation was able to award eight \$250.00 Scholarships, for a total of \$2,000.00 in June of 1967.

Winning the first place award for Illinois, in the Shell Oil Contest of 1967, enabled our club to donate another \$500.00 to the Foundation.

The Wheeling High School Community Scholarship Foundation was now firmly established as a Major Community Organization, able to sponsor its own fund raising activities.

The first activity sponsored by the Wheeling High School Community Scholarship Foundation was "Flower Drum Song". The high school students were inspired to present their own show by the success of "Footlights to the Future". This cooperative venture between the students and the adults raised additional funds for the scholarship assistance program.

In 1967-68, the Wheeling High School Community Scholarship Foundation staged the Variety Show, "Footlights to the Future II - Sounds of Suburbia". Again the Wheeling Junior Woman's Club participated by: having 2 of our members serve on the Foundation Board; all club members participated in the Variety Show, "Footlights to the Future II - Sounds of Suburbia"; all club members sold an average of 5 tickets each; secured ads for, and placed a larger club ad in the adbook for the Variety Show; again helped in the TOTAL COORDINATION OF THE VARIETY SHOW; and performed in our own act. Four members of the Wheeling Junior Woman's Club also participated in other acts presented by other village organizations.*

The Wheeling Junior Woman's Club Husbands' Auxiliary have also * participated in both Variety Shows, and have 2 members on the Foundation Board. One serves as President of the Foundation, and was Master of Ceremonies for both Variety Shows. One member of the Husbands' Auxiliary performed in 3 acts both years.

Ads and ticket sales by club members for "Footlights to the Future II - Sounds of Suburbia" totaled \$400.00, for a total contribution of \$900.00 in 1967-68.

Proceeds from "Footlights to the Future II - Sounds of Suburbia" were about \$3,500.00, which will enable the Foundation to furnish more students with scholarship assistance in May of 1968.

*Participation in the 1967-68 Variety Show included the Buffalo Grove Women's Club, 7th District Illinois Federation of Women's Clubs.

Memorandum for the President

Subject: The Proposed New Tax Bill

The proposed new tax bill, which is being considered by the House of Representatives, contains several provisions that are of great importance to the Nation. It is believed that the bill will result in a significant increase in the Nation's revenue, and it is therefore recommended that the President support the bill.

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WHEELING HIGH SCHOOL COMMUNITY SCHOLARSHIP FOUNDATION

APPROVED & ADOPTED JUNE 2, 1966

PREAMBLE

WHEREAS, the Citizens of Wheeling High School attendance area are desirous of providing scholarship funds and recognition to deserving Wheeling High School students, and

WHEREAS, it is necessary to establish an organization by which to accomplish this purpose,

THEREFORE, for the purpose of establishing the Board of Directors, officers, meeting place and time, the following is hereby enacted as the By-laws of this organization.

ARTICLE I

Board of Directors

Sec. 1. The Board shall consist of 15 members, who shall be residents of the Wheeling High School attendance area.

Sec. 2. The initial Board shall be the steering committee, who, after adoption of these By-laws will draw straws to determine the length of their term of office. Four members shall serve for a period of 1 year, 4 for 2 years, 4 for 3 years and 3 for 4 years.

Sec. 3. Any initial member whose term of office is for less than four years may succeed himself, but thereafter, no member shall succeed himself.

Sec. 4. As much as is practical, an attempt will be made to have representation from all geographic areas of the attendance area of Wheeling High School.

Sec. 5. Dues for membership on the Board of Directors shall be Two Dollars per annum.

ARTICLE II

Officers

Sec. 1. The elected officers shall constitute the executive committee and will consist of:

1. President
2. Vice-President
3. Treasurer
4. Secretary

These officers shall be selected by the Board of Directors from within their membership to serve for a term of one year.

Sec. 2. The remaining eleven members shall be appointed by the President, subject to approval of the majority of the Board, to serve on one or more of the following committees:

1. Public Relations Committee
2. Finance Committee
3. Nominating Committee
4. Student Selection Committee

ARTICLE III

Meetings

Sec. 1. The regular monthly meeting shall be held on the last Tuesday of each month, except that in the event of a holiday, the meeting shall be held on the following Friday.

Sec. 2. Special meetings may be called by the Executive Committee and/or one third of all members of the Board.

Sec. 3. A quorum shall consist of not less than 9 members.

Sec. 4. Meetings shall be held in the Wheeling High School.

Sec. 5. The time of the meetings shall be 8:00 o'clock P.M.

Sec. 6. Each member of the Board shall be notified by mail one week prior to each meeting.

Sec. 7. Any member who misses 3 consecutive regular monthly meetings, or 5 regular monthly meetings during a calendar year, may be replaced at the discretion of the Executive Committee.

Sec. 8. The Regular September meeting shall be the Annual Meeting.

ARTICLE IV

Duties of Officers

Sec. 1. President

- A. Preside at all meetings
- B. Appoint the committees as designated in Article II, Section 2.
- C. Appoint Special Committees as circumstances may require.
- D. Will be one of 4 signatures authorized for the disbursement of funds.
- E. In the event of a vacancy on the Executive Committee, the President shall appoint from the Board of Directors, subject to approval of the Board of Directors, a successor to serve until the next annual meeting.
- F. Appoint committee to audit books of the Treasurer and certify to same at the annual meeting.
- G. Submit agenda for forthcoming meeting to Secretary ten days in advance of all meeting.

ARTICLE IV (Continued)

Sec. 2. Vice-President

- A. Perform all of the duties of the President, in the absence or inability of the President to serve.
- B. Succeed to the Presidency in the event of the resignation or death of the President, for the completion of the unexpired term.
- C. Coordinate the activities of all committees, through the committee chairmen, and report to the President.
- D. Will be one of 4 signatures authorized for the disbursement of funds.

Sec. 3. Treasurer

- A. Keep and maintain all of the financial records and make a financial report at each meeting.
- B. Assume the duties of Chairman of the Finance Committee.
- C. Make disbursements as directed by the Board of Directors.
- D. Will be one of 4 signatures authorized for the disbursement of funds.
- E. Shall deposit funds in the Wheeling State Bank, which shall be the official depository of all funds.

ARTICLE IV (Continued)

Sec. 4. Secretary

- A. Keep an accurate record of the proceedings of all meetings.
- B. Distribute minutes of meetings, agenda and notify all members, by mail, one week in advance of all meetings.
- C. Will be one of 4 signatures authorized for the disbursement of funds.

ARTICLE V

Committees

Sec. 1. Public Relations Committee

- A. Be responsible for the development and compilation of all publicity. All releases of an official nature to any news media shall receive the approval of the President prior to being released.
- B. To assist and cooperate with other committees and/or board members in the development and distribution of special notices, donation requests and brochures or special material as directed by the President.

Sec. 2. Finance Committee

- A. Be responsible for the development of programs for the raising of funds.

Sec. 3. Nominating Committee

- A. Select one nominee for each office, namely: President, Vice-President, Treasurer and Secretary, and submit their nominations in writing to the President. Written notice of the report of the Committee shall then

be mailed to each member of the board at least fifteen (15) days prior to the annual meeting.

- B. Maintain a list of the names of residents who have indicated the desire to serve on the Board, and to submit this list to the members for the selection of replacements for retiring members, in accordance with ARTICLE I.
- C. In addition to the routines described in Paragraphs A & B above, nominations for membership or officers may be made from the floor with the approval of the nominee.

Sec. 4. Student Selection Committee

- A. To verify that applicants meet the requirements of Appendix "A".
- B. Submit not more than ten (10) applications for each scholarship to the Board for final selection. The remaining applicants shall be given a Special or Recognition Award.
- C. Follow-up for 2nd. year assistance.

ARTICLE VI

Membership

Sec. 1. Membership in the foundation shall be open to residents of the Wheeling High School attendance area, students and faculty of Wheeling High School, and any individual or organization contributing to the support of the Foundation.

ARTICLE VII

Surety Bond

Sec. 1. All Officers of the Foundation shall at the expense of the Foundation, furnish a Surety Bond in such amount as the Board of Directors may from time to time prescribe.

ARTICLE VIII

Amendments

Sec. 1. The by-laws may be amended by a two-thirds majority of the members present at a regular monthly meeting.

Sec. 2. Proposed changes must be submitted in writing at a regular monthly meeting, the Secretary will mail copies of the proposed change to every

member of the Board at least one week prior to the next regular monthly meeting, at which time action must be taken.

ARTICLE IX

Parliamentary Authority

Sec. 1. Roberts' Rules of Order (Revised) shall be the Parliamentary Authority in all matters not specified in the by-laws.

Article I

Board of Directors

Sec. 1. The Board shall consist of 15 members who shall be residents of the Wheeling High School attendance area. In addition thereto, there shall be two non-voting members who shall serve in an advisory capacity, and whose titles and specific duties shall be as described in paragraphs 1-A and 1-B of this article.

1-A Registered Agent.

The Principal of Wheeling High School or his appointed agent shall serve as the Registered Agent of the Foundation and his address shall be that of the Wheeling High School. It shall be the duty of the said agent to receive all mail addressed to the foundation, and he shall be registered with the State of Illinois in compliance with the laws of the State of Illinois as defined in the Foundation's Charter.

1-B Institutional Representative.

A member of the faculty of Wheeling High School shall be appointed by the Principal to serve as the Institutional Representative. It shall be the duty of said Representative to assist students in making applications for scholarships, and to receive and process all applications in accordance with Appendix "A" of these By-laws.

Article V.

Duties of Committees

Sec. 4 Student Selection Committee

A. To receive applications for scholarship from the Institutional Representative and to verify that the applicants meet the requirements of Appendix "A" of these By-laws.

APPENDIX A * AS APPROVED SEPTEMBER 27, 1966

I. Criteria for Eligibility to Apply

- ~~A. Must have a "C" average or better.~~
- B. Must have a positive school citizenship record (attendance, discipline)
- C. Must have a desire to advance his education and/or technical skills.
- D. Must have attended Wheeling High School for a minimum of one academic year.

II. Criteria for Selection

- A. The Student Selection Committee will make a preliminary evaluation of all applicants on a numbering system of 0-10 in the following categories:
 - 1. Citizenship
 - 2. Employment
 - 3. Motivation.
 - 4. Need
 - 5. Outside Activities
 - ~~6. References~~
 - 7. Scholarship
- B. The evaluation should result in a recommendation of 10 candidates to the Board of Directors. The committee shall have the prerogative to make special recommendations to the Board on the candidates.

III. The following application form shall be completed by the eligible candidates and submitted to his counselor. All applications shall be numbered and the institutional representative on the Board of Directors shall keep the records.

Terrific Success

"Footlights to the Future," a variety show sponsored by the Wheeling High School Scholarship Foundation, has been termed a terrific success.

Foundation president Harry Tyler said \$2,202 had been cleared by the event with almost 100 per cent tabulation completed.

The money goes to graduating seniors from Wheeling High who want to continue their education or training. The money is not strictly for those college bound; it may also be used for various types of vocational training, said Tyler.

MONEY FROM THE show was gained from the ticket proceeds and advertising in a booklet which was distributed at the program.

Tyler said he was thrilled by the overall reception of the "total community." He pointed out that students going to the

school come from Wheeling, Buffalo Grove, Prospect Heights, Mount Prospect and Arlington Heights.

Both the board of directors of the foundation and especially the students who will receive the money owe a great debt of gratitude to the "literally hundreds of persons who supported the program," said Tyler.

Tyler said the variety show will become an annual fund raising affair.

SOME GROUPS ARE already practicing and planning their portion of the show for next year, he added.

Shirley Koeppen*, president of the Wheeling Junior Woman's Club, was discussing her reaction on learning of her group's first place standing in the contest sponsored by the Illinois Federation of Women's Clubs.

"I wish the whole village could have been at the Sherman House with me. Only the firm support of the community made it possible," Mrs. Koepen continued.

Six club members of the club were present, to help Mrs. Koeppen accept the plaque and \$500 award from the Shell Oil Co., which co-sponsored the contest.

The Wheeling High School Scholarship Foundation and the Community Variety Show, "Footlights to the Future," were the club's entries in the competition.

THESE PROJECTS rounded out a particularly busy year for this small but active organization.

The Scholarship Foundation,

which the club was instrumental in forming, was started because the group wanted "to give a really beneficial scholarship to deserving high school students," according to Mrs. Raymond Olson,* one of the club's staunchest supporters.

With this goal in mind, several members of the women's club got together last April and formed a steering committee, inviting other groups in the area to join.

The response they received was good, and a scholarship foundation was officially formed, helped by \$100 donated by the Wheeling Junior Woman's Club.

FOR THEIR first fund raising event, the foundation decided to hold a community variety show.

Eighty invitations were sent to civic groups in Wheeling, Buffalo Grove, Prospect Heights and Mount Prospect—the area encompassing Wheeling High School.

Twenty-eight of the 80 accepted the invitation.

"We just had a ball putting on the show," exclaimed Donna McMahon.* "It made all kinds of money, and we had a

Each of the participants put together a 5-minute act.

"We had solo singers, piano duets, chorus lines, comedy skits — you name it," Mrs. Olson laughed.

The Wheeling High School Little Theater was filled both nights the show was presented, Feb. 17 and 18.

"WE HAD OUR own chorus line — the 'June Failer Dancers,' complete with top hats. But the highlight of the evening came when our husbands performed," Mrs. Olson, who coordinated the program, continued.

"They put on a woman's fashion show, and appeared in all sorts of ridiculous get-ups, even negligees.

"I guess the high point of the skit came when one of the husbands appeared in a bikini, complete with a jewel in his navel."

"It was just hysterical," recalled Mrs. Raymond Spletzer, who serves on the Scholarship Foundation with Mrs. Olson.

Proceeds from the show netted \$1,000 for the scholarship fund. The women also solicited

ads from local merchants and put them in a book, which brought the total to about \$2,500.

OF THIS amount, \$2,000 will be awarded in scholarships to students at Wheeling High School this spring.

"We are thrilled to be able to give such a large amount when the foundation has been in existence only a year," Mrs. Spletzer said with obvious pride.

These two projects, the Scholarship Foundation and the community variety show, were then entered in the state competition sponsored by the Illinois Federation of Woman's Clubs and Shell Oil.

"I just can't begin to tell you how proud we were to win," Shirley Koeppen said.

"We knew beforehand that we were one of the top three, but we didn't dream we would win. It was done like the Academy Awards, complete with envelopes.

"THE EXCITEMENT was terrific. I guess I'm still floating around in the clouds."

For its first place standing, the club won \$500, a plaque from Shell Oil, and a chance

to compete in the national contest.

The national contest will be held in San Francisco June 4, 5 and 6.

"If we are invited to attend this convention, we will know we are one of the three top in the nation," Mrs. Koeppen explained.

She said the group is "keeping its fingers crossed."

"But we're thrilled just to win the state award. Our cup runneth over, so to speak."

This most recent award is only one of many the group has won since its formation in 1958.

THE CLUB WON the Community Improvement contest in 1960, sponsored by Sears Roebuck and Co. It won first place at the state level and sixth in national competition, based on two year's over-all work in the area of community improvement.

The club was instrumental in having sidewalks installed at the Milwaukee and Dundee intersection.

Members also helped establish the Wheeling Public Library.

"We saw the need for a library in Wheeling and worked to promote it," according to Mrs. Olson.

Seven years ago the group started a scholarship program to further the education of special education teachers.

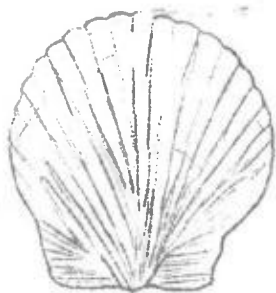

Three of Illinois' Federated Women's Clubs were honored May 9 at the Sherman House in Chicago for their efforts in helping young people to gain a better education.

Awards totaling \$1,000 were presented to the winning clubs at the annual State Federation convention here by Richard L. Parkhurst, Administrative Manager for Shell Oil Company, sponsor of the award program.

First-place award of \$500 went to the Wheeling Junior Woman's Club while second- and third-place awards of \$300 and \$200 respectively were presented to the Cahokia Junior Woman's Club and the Danville Junior Woman's Club. The cash prizes, which are used by clubs to further their education programs, are among 150 state and three national awards being made this year through the General Federation of Women's Clubs-Shell Oil Company Education program.

Wheeling Junior Woman's Club won its award for initiating a community-wide effort that resulted in the formation of the Wheeling High School Community Scholarship Foundation. The club sponsored a "kickoff" meeting to stimulate community interest in a scholarship foundation and donated \$100 to start the fund. As developed, the foundation will provide scholarship aid to local high school graduates planning to attend college or vocational schools. Club members coordinated all activities of the Foundation's variety show, a fund-raising event which won the cooperation of 28 groups in the area. The show and a show Adbook raised over \$2,500 for the foundation.

Cahokia Junior Woman's Club won its award for contributing to the educational development of children and young people through summer programs and scholarships. The club established a ten-week summer day camp program for elementary school children, financing the \$400 cost with the proceeds of a charity ball. It also enabled three children to attend camps for mentally retarded and crippled children and awarded a \$100 scholarship to a teacher of exceptional children. Members were active in a visual screening program for kindergarten children, sponsored a community-wide International Festival and contributed to other educational projects.

Danville Junior Woman's Club won its award for a diversified program of scholarships and other aid to local and foreign students, teachers and various educational facilities. The club awarded a \$100 Danville Junior College scholar-

ship, granted an interest-free \$1,000 loan to a nursing student, made a \$400 payment on a three-year, \$1,200 pledge to the junior college, provided \$350 for the foreign exchange program and aided the Children's Home. 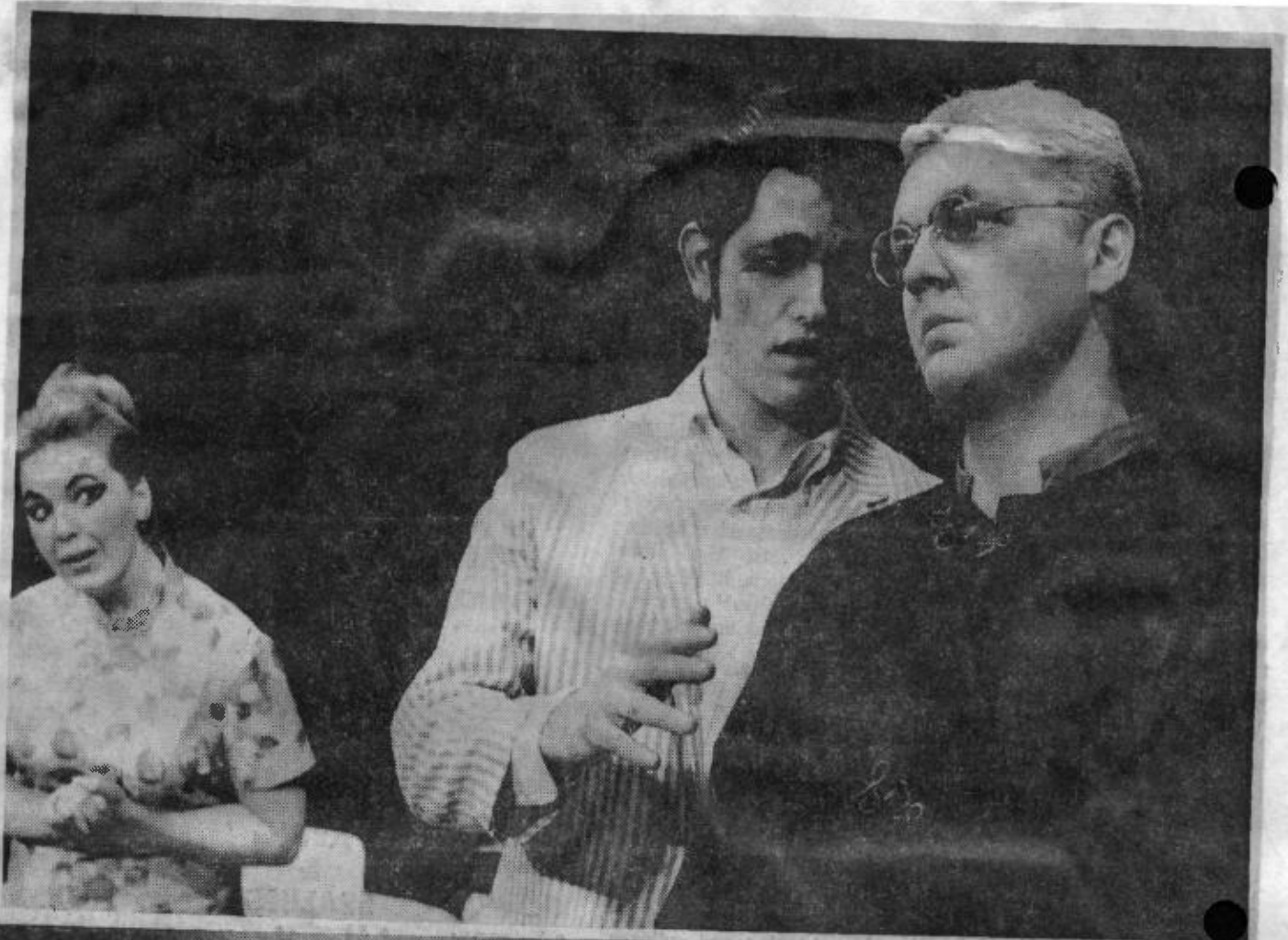

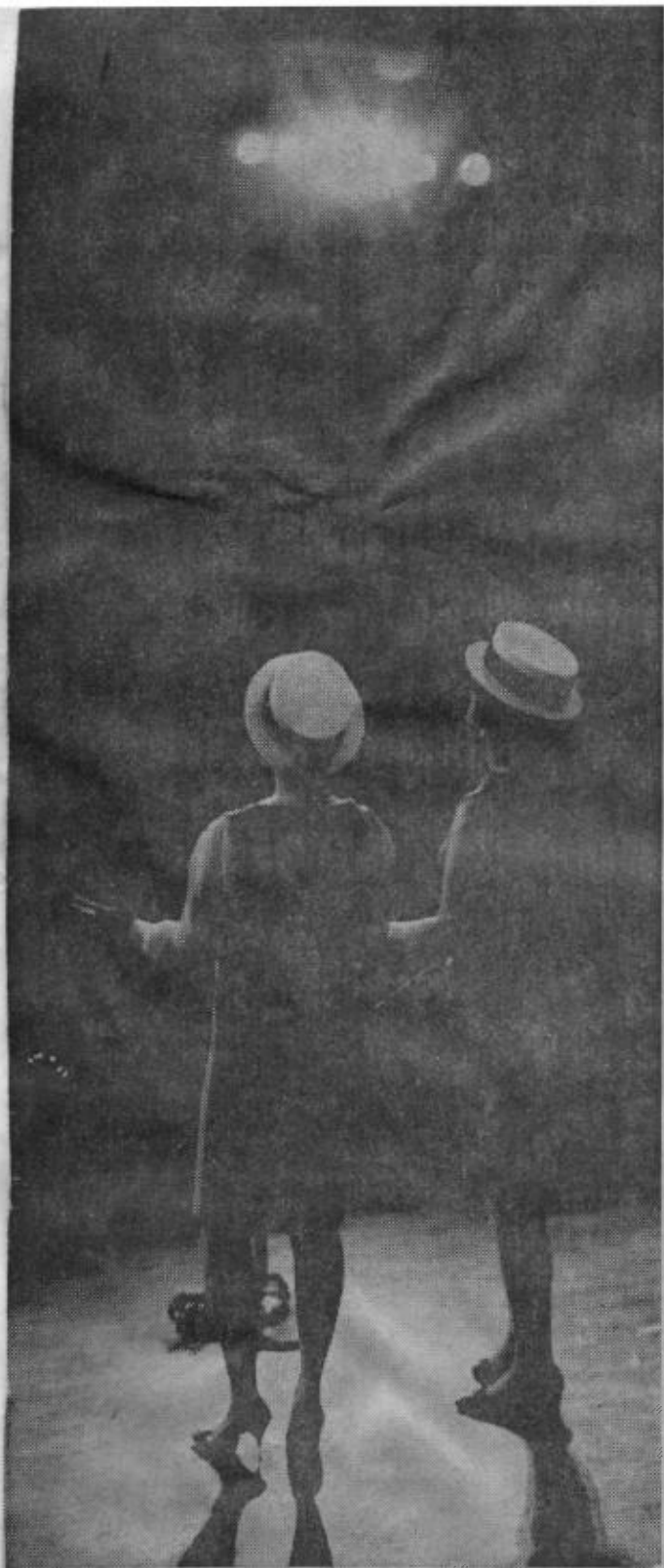

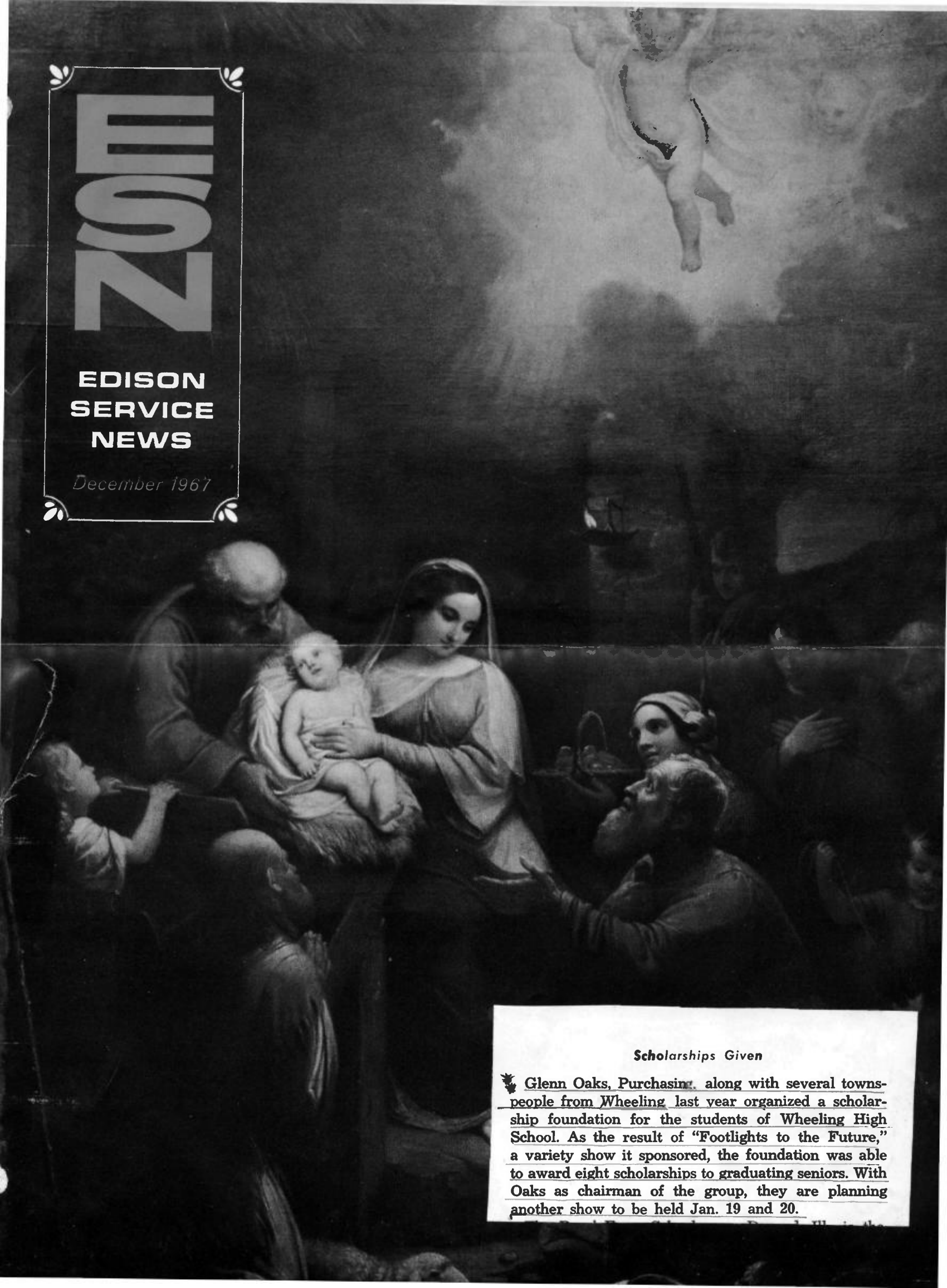

A bouquet of praise also goes to MC Glenn Oaks who masterfully held the show together with his funny and not-so-funny cracks and quips.

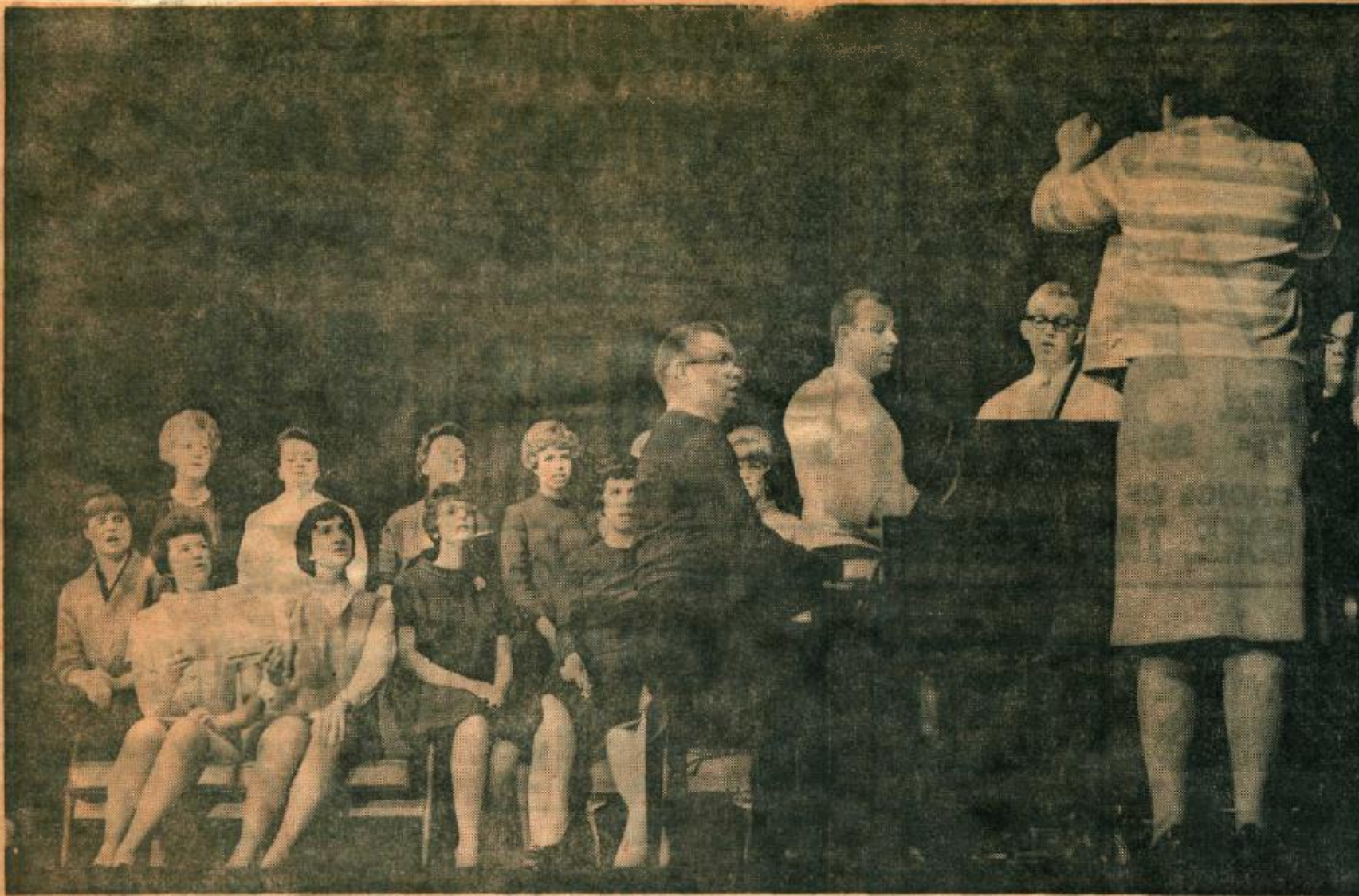

In March of 1967, the initial planning sessions were held by the Youth, and Education Committees of the Wheeling Junior Woman's Club to lay the groundwork for Wheeling's first Baby Sitting Clinic, another project initiated and conducted by the Wheeling Junior Woman's Club.

Working with material supplied by the Schaumburg Junior Woman's Club, and the Curriculum Director of Grade School District #21, a six week course was planned for September and October of 1967.

During July and August, needed material was printed, compiled, and made ready for distribution. Final arrangements were made with guest speakers.

Invitations to attend the Clinic were extended to all 7th grade and older students in Grade School District #21.

Due to a change in Grade School District #21 Curriculum Director, and Federal Grants to the School District under the Title III Program, during the summer of 1967, the Baby Sitting Clinic was not included in the fall schedule. Only repeated telephone calls and visits to the School Administration Offices enabled our program to be reinstated. Thirty-two students were able to attend the Baby Sitting Clinic.

However, we feel that both the School District, and the Title III Programs will now have better communications with each other, and with the rest of the community. Both of these groups felt that the Baby Sitting Clinic, as presented by the Wheeling Junior Woman's Club was of great benefit to the community. We have been asked to repeat the program this spring.

Sessions will be held from 4 to 5 p.m. each Thursday for six weeks, concluding Oct. 20 with a graduation ceremony. Sessions will be held in the Jack London Junior High School Cafeteria, Wheeling.

The clinic is a first in the area, according to the sponsoring club.

ALL SEVENTH graders and older students living within the boundaries of grade school dis-

trict 21 are eligible to attend. This district includes St. Mary's, St. Joseph the Worker, Wheeling High, Holmes Junior High and Jack London Junior High schools.

To help cover the cost of the 6-week course, a tuition of \$1 is being charged and young people are asked to bring the tuition fee along with their completed registration blanks to the first session. Registration blanks are available at the schools this week, Sept. 11-16.

Finding, training and keeping a sitter is not however, a simple task. Of all the jobs a mother fills - wife, nurse, chef, teacher - that of "personnel director" sits most uneasily on her head. Few people are called upon to find substitutes for themselves - even for only a few hours. Intuition, common sense and watchfulness can help make a wise choice.

All 7th grade and older students living within the boundaries of grade school District No. 21 are eligible to attend. This includes St. Mary's School, St. Joseph the Worker, Wheeling High School, Holmes Jr. High School, and Jack London Jr. High School. Cost of \$1.00 per student will be asked to help Jr. High School. \$1.00 per student will be asked to help cover the cost of giving the course. THE MEDICAL ASPECTS OF BABY SITTING

- A. Information needed before parents leave.
 - 1. Inquire if child has been ill and nature of illness.
 - 2. Location of childrens' rooms.
 - 3. Names and ages.
 - 4. How children ask for drink or to get to toilet.
 - 5. How infant sleeps.
 - a. If he sleeps on stomach or with a favorite toy.
 - 6. What type of diet and amount of food eaten by each child.
- B. General precautions.
 - 1. Leave door if infant's room open.
 - 2. If child vomits, remain calm.
 - a. Pick up child.
 - b. Face down and lower the head.
 - c. Pat back gently.
 - d. Run finger throughout mouth to remove excess vomit.
 - e. Call Parents.
 - 3. Keep radio and T.V. low.
 - 4. Don't stay on telephone for long periods.
 - 5. Don't entertain friends.
 - 6. Know where medicines are and how to use them.
- C. Emergency treatment which could be rendered by baby sitter.
 - 1. Fever.
 - a. Learn to read thermometer.
 - 1. Place baby on abdomen or side.
 - 2. Insert lubricated thermometer.
 - 3. Do not force--insert about one inch.
 - b. Normal rectal temperature is 99.6 or 1 degree higher than by mouth.

2. Incessant crying especially by infant.
 - a. Causes.
 1. Loneliness or colic.
 2. Earache.
 3. Teething.
 4. Fever.
 5. Open safety pin.
 6. Hunger.
3. Abdominal pain in older child.
 - a. Common in 4 to 8 year age group.
 - b. If complaint seems genuine and persists, seek assistance.
 - c. If vomiting, fever or diarrhea appear, seek assistance.
 - d. Persistent diarrhea in infant, may cause dehydration.
4. Nose bleeds.
 - a. Remain calm and reassure the child.
 - b. Hold nose tightly.
 - c. Place cold packs over nose and behind neck.
 - d. If bleeding persists, seek assistance.
 - e. Child may vomit blood.
 1. Intestinal tract does not digest blood.
 2. Blood usually comes up when swallowed, and is a little darker.
5. Bumps.
 - a. Swelling usually worse than impact.
 - b. Apply something cold.
 - c. If child is knocked out or vomits, seek assistance.
 - d. If extremity is not used properly after fall, it may be fractured.

6. Abrasions and lacerations.
 - a. Wash wound under running water with clean soap.
 - b. Apply antiseptic which has been recommended by parent.
 - c. Cover with bandage or band-aid.
 - d. Gaping wound or excessive bleeding.
 1. Apply direct pressure.
 2. Call doctor.
7. Dog bite.
 - a. Scrub wound with soap and water.
 - b. Call doctor.
8. Burns.
 - a. If merely redness develops.
 1. Apply burn ointment.
 2. Cover with clean dressing.
9. Convulsions-usually due to high fever.
 - a. Don't restrain movements.
 - b. Lay child on side.
 - c. Insert mouth gag.
 - d. Get operator to call doctor.
 - e. Undress and sponge infant with cool water.
10. Croup which develops after child has been sleeping.
 - a. Use vaporizer, only on advise of parent.
 - b. If vaporizer is not available:
 1. Take child in bathroom.
 2. Run hot water through shower head to provide steam.
 - c. Call parents.
11. Poisons or over-doses of medicines.
 - a. Induce vomiting.
 1. Gag with handle of spoon.
 - b. Call parents and doctor immediately.

- c. Have container with you, when you call.
 - d. Give as much milk and egg white as possible.
12. If doctor is called and not available, tell them(wife, doctor's nurse, answering service) you are the sitter and need help.
13. Personal hygiene.

TIPS FOR BABY SITTER'S SAFETY

A. Responsibilities.

1. Safety and care of children and yourself.
2. To protect property.
3. To assist in apprehension of anyone attempting to commit a crime.

B. Things to be checked.

1. Know where the family has gone; and the telephone number.
2. Know when they expect to return.
3. Know whether or not they are expecting telephone calls or visitors.
4. Know that all doors and ground floor windows are locked.
5. Know the telephone number of the Fire and Police Departments.
6. Know the layout of the house and where the children are located.
7. Have some sort of Code when the parents come home.
8. Know name of Neighbor to call in emergency.
9. Make sure you have a safe way to get to and from baby sitting place.
10. Make certain your parents know where you are.

C. Procedure for Telephone Calls.

1. Avoid a direct answer when the parent is not available.
2. Get the name and telephone number of the person calling.
 - a. Write all telephone messages on a pad; then you won't forget them.
 - b. Check this information in the telephone book to see if it is correct.
3. If information is not correct:

- a. Telephone the parents to see if they know the person who called.
- b. Report to the Police Department any unusual telephone calls where no one answers, or asks personal or unusual questions, or will not identify themselves.
- c. Call the number back and ask for the person who called. If they answer, tell them the people will call the next day.

D. Procedure if Doorbell is Rung.

1. Do not open or unlock the door.
 - a. The person who is up to no good will tell you a story that is easy to believe to get you to open the door. For example:--" I am a delivery man, please sign for this delivery." Or "I am Mr. Jones from next door and I want to get the hammer your employer borrowed last week."
2. Put a light on the entrance.
3. Look from a window if possible.
4. Tell the person to come back the next day.
5. Make sure they leave or call the police.

E. Procedure if Person Enters.

1. Keep furniture between you and the intruder and find out what he wants.
2. If he attempts to harm you:
 - a. Throw something through a window and yell if neighbors are close.
 - b. Scratch his face.
 - c. Bite his hand.
 - d. Kick him in the stomach.

- e. Do not get a knife or gun.
 - f. Try to remember what he looks like--compare size with people you know.
 - g. Get out if possible and call the police.
- F. Report to the Police Department Immediately any Strange Happenings.
- 1. Peeping "Toms".
 - a. Do not let the suspicious persons know you are calling the Police. Be as casual as possible and try to place yourself between the person's vision and the telephone. Call the Police. This person must be caught or he will return.
 - 2. Strangers or strange cars loitering about or circling the block.
- G. Procedure for Outdoor Play.
- 1. Check children frequently.
 - 2. Call children in if any stranger is around.

FIRE DEPARTMENT SAFETY PRECAUTIONS

- A. You will make a good baby sitter if you can answer "yes" to the following questions:
 - 1. Do you like children?
 - 2. Do you have a well-developed sense of responsibility?
 - 3. Are you safety minded?
 - 4. Can you keep your head in an emergency?

- B. Prepare yourself for this important job.
 - 1. Remember that the lives and safety of the children left in your care depend upon you.
 - 2. Take your information sheet, including the signed pledge, with you and insist that the parents fill it out.
 - a. Record where parents are going and how you can contact them.
 - b. Record name and telephone number of family doctor.
 - c. Record name and telephone number of nearest neighbor or relative.
 - d. Record telephone numbers of the Fire and Police Departments and the Rescue Squad.
 - 3. Arrange to have flashlight handy--take one from home if necessary.
 - a. Loss of lights can be very frightening to everyone, especially children.
 - 4. Have the parents show you about the house.
 - a. Note the location and number of exits.
 - b. Note which windows could be used as exits in an emergency.
 - c. Note location of telephone.
 - 5. After the parents have left, make sure that the doors are locked.

C. If you smell smoke or see fire:

1. Keep calm.
2. Do not try to locate source of fire.
3. Get the children.
 - a. Wrap them in blankets.
 - b. Above all, do not stop to dress them.
 - c. Get the children out of the house.
 - d. Take the children to the nearest neighbor's home.
4. Call the Fire Department from neighbor's home.
 - a. Tell them there is a house fire.
 - b. Give name of street and house number and general area.
5. Be out in front to direct the Firemen:

D. Emergency Safety Precautions.

1. Don't open any inside doors without first feeling the door panels. If they are hot, don't open the door.
 - a. Fire or hot killing gases are on the other side.
2. Don't try to come down a smoke or fire filled stairway.
 - a. Stay in the room with the door closed, open the window and get the children's heads and your own out in the fresh air.
 - b. Shout for help.
 - c. As a last resort, fashion a rope of sheets down which you can lower the children; then slide down hand over hand yourself.
 - d. Don't jump.

E. Smoking and Matches.

1. If you smoke, get the parents consent first.
2. If you smoke, make sure to be careful in the disposal of ashes, cigarettes and matches--be sure they are out.

3. Do not put hot ashes, cigarettes or matches in paper bag, carton or wooden box.
4. Do not go to see what is wrong with children with a cigarette in your hand or mouth.
5. Do not leave a cigarette burning when answering or using the telephone.
 - a. Do not talk on the telephone too long.
6. Make sure that matches are out of reach of children.

F. General Precautions.

1. Do not let children play with electrical appliances or cords.
2. Do not let children put anything into electrical outlets.
3. Keep children away from stove at all times.
4. Check children's rooms periodically.
5. Be careful in use of oil burners, gas stoves, electrical appliances and fireplaces.

G. The Eight Principal Causes of Fire in the Home.

1. The careless smoking and handling of matches.
2. Misuse of electricity.
3. Defective or overheated heating and cooking equipment.
4. Improper disposal of rubbish.
5. Careless handling of kerosene, gasoline and other flammable liquids.
6. Lightning.
7. Defective or overheated chimneys.
8. Children with matches.

H. Resuscitator.

1. Available at Fire Department for emergencies.
2. Complete demonstration of its use was given.

REMEMBER:---

It takes only a few seconds for killing heat and smoke to travel. Make every second count.

Don't be afraid to call your Fire Department in an emergency.

ACCIDENT PREVENTION AND FIRST AID FOR BABY SITTERS

A. Definitions.

1. Accident prevention is the preventing of an unfortunate incident or event by the use of common judgement and good training.
2. First Aid is the immediate and temporary care given the victim of an accident or sudden illness until the services of a physician can be obtained.

B. Purposes of Accident Prevention and First Aid.

1. To prevent accidents.
2. To train people to do the right thing at the right time when needed.
3. To prevent added injury.
4. Proper and immediate care often necessary to save life.
5. People very often harm rather than help because of improper training.

C. General Knowledge.

1. Know where parents have gone and how to reach them.
2. Keep telephone free.
3. Get special instructions from parents.
4. Make sure outer doors are locked.
5. Do not let strangers in.
6. Know where first aid materials and medicines are.
7. Keep small objects out of crib.
8. Keep child in sight.

D. General Directions.

1. Keep child lying down and in comfortable position.

2. Examine for:
 - a. Serious bleeding.
 - b. Stoppage of breathing.
 - c. Internal poisoning.
(a,b,&c, are most serious-
look for in order mentioned)
 - d. Broken bones, burns, head injuries.
3. Keep child warm.
4. Keep yourself calm and do not
be hurried.
5. If serious injury, get physician
and ambulance.

E. Wounds.

1. Definitions.
 - a. Abrased-Scraped or Rubbed wound.
 1. Chief danger-infection
 2. Cleanse thoroughly
 - b. Punctured-Made by nail, ice pick, etc.
 1. Chief danger-infection
 2. Call doctor.
 - c. Lacerated-Torn or Jagged wound.
 1. Danger of both serious bleeding
and infection.
 2. Most serious.
 - d. Incised-Made by sharp knife,
razor blade, etc.
 1. Chief danger-serious bleeding
 2. Control bleeding.
2. First Aid.
 - a. Wounds without serious bleeding.
 1. Abrased or punctured
 - a. Wash wound with water
using clean cloth.
 - b. Apply band-aid or light
dressing covered by bandage.
 - b. Wounds with serious bleeding.
 1. Lacerated or Incised.
 - a. Stop bleeding by direct
pressure over wound.
 - b. Apply compress of sterile
cloths or semi-sterile cloths
(freshly laundered napkins,
handkerchiefs, etc.)

- c. Bandage snugly and firmly.
- d. Call ambulance immediately.
- e. Practice general directions (section D).

F. Artificial Respiration.

- 1. Definition.
- 2. Causes of stoppage of breathing (types of accidents).
- 3. First Aid- Mouth to mouth artificial respiration.
- 4. After treatment.

G. Poisons.

- 1. Keep children away from medicine cabinets.
- 2. Do not let children play with unlabeled bottles.
- 3. Do not give children medicines at their request.
- 4. If medicine is properly prescribed, be sure you have picked up right bottle and read label carefully.
- 5. Signs and symptoms of poisoning.
- 6. First aid.
 - a. Dilute immediately by giving several glasses of water with large teaspoon of baking soda in each glass, if available.
 - b. Salt water may be substituted to induce vomiting.
 - c. Milk may also be given.
 - d. Call doctor.
 - e. This first aid is for common type poisons found around the house.

H. Burns.

- 1. Keep children away from stoves, fireplaces, ovens.
- 2. Do not place or leave containers with hot liquids within reach.
- 3. Do not let children play around electrical fixtures and outlets.

4. Keep matches out of reach. DO NOT INVITE FIRES.
5. First aid.
 - a. First degree- reddened skin.
 1. Apply cool water to relieve pain.
 2. Cover with sterile bandage.
 - b. Second degree - blisters present.
 1. Do not open blisters.
 2. Do not remove wax or metal like substance from burn.
 3. Cover area with dressing and call doctor.
 - c. Third degree - burning of deeper tissues, cooking of skin.
 1. Cover area with dressing (clean sheet or towel)
 2. Watch for symptoms of shock.
 3. Keep victim warm and call doctor.
 - d. Shock.
 1. Symptoms
 2. Definition
 3. First aid

Other Emergencies.

1. Falls
 - a. If child is hurt and in pain following fall, have child remain still and call parents or doctor.
2. Foreign objects in eyes.
 - a. Do not attempt to remove large embeded objects from eye.
 - b. Cover both eyes lightly.
 - c. Get further help-doctor or parents.
3. Nosebleed.
 - a. Sit child up with head thrown back.
 - b. Pinch nostrils together or apply cold towel over bridge of nose.
4. Foreign objects in throat.
 - a. Head down, pat on back, keep air passage open with finger.
 - b. Call doctor if this does not release object.

INFANT AND CHILD CARE

A. Methods of Changing Diapers.

1. Safety Measures.

- a. Careful handling of safety pins.
- b. Always keep hand on infant while reaching for and articles.
- c. Strap baby on bathinettes if bathinettes are available.
- d. Never leave baby on bed alone.

B. Feeding Routines.

1. If bottle is to be heated, test for warmth.
2. Feeding of solids.
3. Bubbling infants.
4. Checking infant for vomiting or spitting after feeding.
5. Watch child that takes own bottle.
6. Care of nipples and bottles.
7. Treatment of hiccups.
 - a. Pat on back.
 - b. Water.
8. Reasons for not eating.
 - a. Illness.
 - b. Strangeness.
9. If gagging or choking occurs put face down and pat on back.

C. Nap and Bedtime Routine.

1. Atmosphere for safety and quiet.
 - a. Dark and quiet room.
 - b. Removing of certain clothing for comfort.
2. Proper covering.
 - a. Safety.
 - b. Warmth.
3. Toys and Books.
 - a. Favorite toys recommended only by parents.
 - b. Special blanket.
 - c. Special diapers.

4. Temperature of room.
 - a. Prevent drafts.
5. Problems of child that will not and cannot go to sleep.
 - a. Fears.
 - b. Loneliness.
 - c. Attention getting.
 1. Asking for water.
 2. Asking for books.
 3. Asking for lights on.
- D. Responsibilities of Sitter After Child is Settled in Bed.
 1. Observe child frequently.
 2. Leave door open.
 3. Keep phone calls limited and short.
- E. Children's Equipment.
 1. Safety measures.
 - a. Using safety straps.
 - b. Preventing falls.
 - c. If in carriage be sure brake is on, if parked.
 - d. Never leave a child unattended while in carriage or anywhere.
- F. Outdoor Care.
 1. Proper clothing.
 2. Safe play and safe toys.
 3. Wandering.
- G. Baby Sitting is a Grave Responsibility.

NEVER LEAVE CHILD UNATTENDED
- H. Emergencies.
 1. Phone number of where parents can be reached.
 2. Phone number of child's doctor.
 3. Phone number of hospital.
 4. Phone number of police.

CONTROL AND ENTERTAINMENT OF CHILDREN

- A. Be Dependable.
 - 1. Promptness is important.
 - 2. Meet mother and family before you sit.
 - a. Get acquainted.
 - b. Know what is expected of you and do it.
 - c. Learn where things are.
 - 3. Be able to prepare a simple meal.
 - 4. See that things are neat and orderly when the parents return.
 - a. See that children or you clean up.
 - 5. Do not take liberties with the property of others.
 - a. Refrigerator.
 - b. Telephone.
 - c. Personal property of any sort.
 - d. Clean up after using kitchen.
 - 6. Never encourage a child to disregard a parent's instructions.
 - 7. Remember, you are the sole authority in the home when the mother is absent--use this authority wisely.
 - 8. Don't suggest that a child not tell his parents any of the events of the day.
- B. Do not Bring Boy Friends or Girl Friends to the Home.
 - 1. You owe all your attention to the care and well-being of the child.
- C. Consider the Child as an Individual.
 - 1. Don't scold constantly or order him about.
 - 2. Let him know what is expected of him--see that he does it.
- D. Be Kind.
 - 1. Affection and thoughtfulness are important.

E. Be Quick to Size up a Situation and do what is Necessary.

F. Be Firm.

1. Do not over-indulge child.
2. Do not let a situation get out of hand.
3. Do not frighten a child.
4. Do not threaten.
5. Do not spank or slap a child unless specifically advised by the parents.
6. Be quiet spoken and pleasant.
7. Give your time to the child.
 - a. Homework, your T.V. programs, telephone conversations, reading, phonograph sessions should not be indulged in until after child is in bed.

G. Find Out What the Child's Interests Are.

H. Do not allow Child to Become Over-tired.

1. The over-tired child is not easy to manage.

I. Be Able to Give a Child Help at His Meals, With His Clothes, and With His Preparations for the Night, if Such Help is Necessary.

1. Make a game of things with the younger child.
2. Don't expect a young child to do things which are too difficult for him.

J. Game and Activities Should be Geared to a Child's Age Level.

1. Indoor or outdoor games according to time, weather and child's age.
 - a. Hikes, walks, etc.
 - b. If you can, help the child learn new sports or games.
2. Let him hear his records on the

phonograph, watch T.V. or listen to the radio if the program is right for him.

- K. It is Important to Have Quiet Activities Before Bedtime.
 - 1. Quiet games, songs, stories, etc. are excellent precursfew entertainment.
 - 2. Tell child 5 to 10 minutes beforehand that bedtime is near.
- L. Be familiar with Activities Which Different Age Groups Like.
- M. Be most Conscientious in Your Relationships with the Child and his Parents.
- N. Be Able to Give the Parent an Accurate Resume of the Happenings of the Day.
 - 1. If you need hilp in controlling child, the parent probably can give you **some** valuable suggestions.

Babysitting Clinic Still Has Openings

Registrations are still being accepted for the Wheeling Junior Women's Club Babysitting Clinic.

Open to students in the seventh grade and up attending Wheeling and Buffalo Grove schools, the six-week clinic meets every Thursday from 4 to 5 p.m. at Jack London Junior High School.

The clinic is designed to prepare young girls and boys for babysitting jobs as well as helping out at home.

THE CLINIC began last Thursday with a movie on the ABC's of babysitting and a question and answer period.

Other sessions will include a demonstration and lecture on

the holding, dressing and feeding of young children, emergency treatment for minor injuries, storytelling for youngsters, and what a parent expects from a babysitter.

During the last session Oct. 26, participants will receive a completion card for the course.

BabySitting
