We discussed the purchase of a wireless microphone which was tabled to another time.


Again, the subject was brought up about interviewing some of our senior residents for their input relative to the their thoughts and remembering their years spent living in Wheeling.

A Bit of History



Illinois in 1856

From the Chicago Historical Society in 1956; a portion of a Centennial article:

"Everyone tusseled with malaria and other diseases". An excerpt from a handbook published in 1856 reveals the relevance of illness and the state of medical knowledge: "Everyone knows that of all diseases the ague occurs most frequently in Illinois, but they will know also, that while new ground is annually subjugated to culture, the disease is confined to more and more narrow limits; and further, that it depends very much upon the particular plan of abode, and manner of living, whether the fever is to visit a family or not. Whosoever resides in the bottoms or close to the swamps, or in districts where the water cannot rapidly flow off, will be more exposed to the fever than one who resides on the high, rolling prairie. Moreover it is perfectly safe to presume that one-half of those who are down with this fever have to ascribe this to nothing but their own imprudence, and the use of improper food."

"To the latter cause must be added, drinking of stagnant water, or a too immoderate use of fruits, lard, eggs, or fish; and, further, nobody should needlessly expose himself to the night air, but live in substantially-built dwellings and sleep in well-ventilated rooms; wearing by day thin clothing and in the evening, when exposed to the night air, warm, thick clothing, and making a fire in the grate, whenever, even in the midst of summer, a change of temperature should occur, especially when it begins to rain. But few of those strictly following these rules will ever be visited by the fever."

"Even in the towns there was an almost complete absence of sanitary facilities. Inside plumbing was almost unknown; city-dwellers, like the farmers, used privies. Outside of Chicago, water for all purposes came from wells and cistern. No place had a drainage system. In bad weather the streets turned into morasses of mud. Hogs wallowed in the streets and often disputed the narrow board sidewalks with pedestrians."

We are glad that we didn't live here 150 years ago!

CURATOR'S/ REPORT/

Early on a September morning, Curato: Parti Steilen and I went to the museum to begin reorganizing the artifacts and supplies in the storage area. Some of these items are used to create the displays and include materials for backdrops and other props for decorating the exhibits.

We want to continue preserving, protecting, and improving the overall care of our collections. One practical idea is simply replacing the cardboard packaging of some items with more durable storage containers. We purchased some bins and will label the contents for easier identification and we are also benefiting from this task by becoming familiar with the museum's resources!

Meanwhile, Marilyn Chromy, Bev Rossman and Patti Hancock are continuing their work on their primary projects which include inventorying, obituaries and research.

On a recent Thursday morning we had visitors stop by asking for our assistance with their research Mr. And Mrs. Jahn are looking for the Kranz and and Stein families in Wheeling. We checked our reference books, found them in the Wheeling cemetery and identified several names in the sections and plots where they could continue their research. They were pleased and grateful that we had the resources available to help them. This is a great example of researchers reaping the benefits of the diligence and hard work that was put into these records years ago! We are also investigating sources for training, whether online or in person, to learn more about the care and maintenance of our collections.

Here is an ongoing project that is exciting to look at: we are scanning our collection of negatives (an assortment of people and places), beginning with the Welfin's store and home. The first envelope of negatives selected was labeled "Welfin's Photos" and Armistice Day, November 1918." They include a decorated automobile for a parade, as well as several excellent interior shots of the Welflin store. The negatives are scanned to a high-res TIF file for safe-keeping and from that we can produce JPGA files that are enhanced for better reproduction while leaving the "original" untouched.

This has been a most exciting time for both the Curator and myself.

Those with money had plates made of pewter. Food with high acid content caused some of the lead to leach onto the food, causing lead poisoning death. This happened most often with tomatoes, so for the next 400 years, or so, tomatoes were considered poisonous.

Linda, Joan and I interviewed Shirley McConnell and received new information regarding life in the 1920's and 30's in Wheeling. Thank you Shirley


Beverly has been going through old negatives and pictures. We are hoping to take only the negatives and pictures which relate to Wheeling and it residents.




LIFE IN THE 1500's






Marilyn along with logging the obituaries, helps us when we get into something that is too big for us to handle.

As for Wheeling's people today, they are all types. in the last 10 to 15 years, the town has become one of the more cosmopolitan villages in the area. Blue collar workers, executives, migrant laborers all can be found in Wheeling.

And Wheeling will soon see more of another kind of resident: the apartment dweller. Two planned apartment developments are already slated for the village. Scanlon sees one of those, the Mallard Lake development in the southwest part of the village, as a sparkplug for similar complexes.

"Our industrial park is no Centex," says Scanlon referring to Elk Grove's industrial development, "but it's a fairly good one."

The Soo Line railroad tracks have boosted industrial development in the village. But industries requiring truck shipments to and from Chicago generally are loathe to locate in Wheeling because it falls outside of the Chicago metropolitan freight rate zone. "We're working on that," says Scanlon.

One big headache for Wheeling is the lack of public transportation, either to Chicago or to other villages. Naturally, Wheeling would like to see the Soo Line develop a commuter operation through Wheeling similar to that of the Chicago and North Western Railroad.

Scanlon said that he has discussed the plan informally with the Soo Line officials. "Soo Line doesn't appear to be interested, through," he said. He sees federal funds as the only means of getting a commuter operation in Wheeling.



Antique Buttons Get Turned Into Rings and Things Taken from Chicago Tribune February 20,1991 By Kathy Gurchiek

Antique works of art that once adorned opera capes of the Gay '90s or a child's christening gown from the 1800s are enjoying a rebirth as rings and Brooches, clip and pierced earrings, cufflinks and other forms of jeweiry.

Sonni Helmer and Beverly Eisenstein, owners of Le Bouton in Glenview, create one of a kind jewelry using antique buttons and buckles, most of which predate 1900.

"Buttons are and were a work of art," says Helmer. "They told the world where you were in society." They were made of a variety of materials, including marcasite and Bakelite, she said, and often were commissioned for a particular garment.

Prices range from \$5 to a \$200 for a pair Of earrings made from French buttons from the 1700s. Most items, however, are under \$100. The women research each piece, which is accompanied with its own history, such as the age of the button, materials used, artist or company and country of origin.

One of a kind jewelry using antique buttons and buckles, can be found at Le Bouton.




On Satur4day April 25th, a group of Historical Society members met at the Old Munich Inn on North Milwaukee Avenue. We interviewed

With a population hovering just under 1,000, the town appeared resigned and content with its size.

Then came the boom. Developers swooped down on the little village promising fantastic growth, soaring property values and climbing tax revenues.

And the boom was great for the village; great that is, until the first rain. At that point Wheeling noticed some of its new subdivisions were built on flood plains. Ever since, the village has had to cope with flooding to a greater or lesser degree.

"With growth like what we had, you have problems you never expected," said Ted Scanlon, village president. "We became educated fast!"

Scanlon said that today no construction is allowed on flood plain areas unless the developer can show that potential flooding problems will be taken care of.


Wheeling is one of the few area villages to have flood plain ordinances and flood plain maps. It learned its lesson hard, but, hopefully, it learned it well.

YET, WHAT ABOUT the flooding that still occurs today? To this Scanlon said, "The solution appears to be a 107 acre retention basin north of the village." He said he expected the project to be built within a few years.

The same subdivisions that presented the flooding problems to Wheeling also resulted in the village's rapid growth. Today more than 13,000 people live in Wheeling.

The subdivisions brought a new kind of person to Wheeling. In a sense the village became two villages. Long-time rural oriented residents work, and sho with the new suburbanites.



LIFE IN THE 1500'S ...

The floor was dirt. Only the wealthy had something Other than dirt. Hence the saying, Dirt poor.

The wealthy had slate floors that would get slippery in the winter when wet, so they spread thresh (straw) on the floor to help keep their footing. As the winter wore on they added more thresh until, when you opened the door, it would all start slipping outside. A piece of wood was placed in the entrance way. Hence the saying a thresh hold.

In those old days, they cooked in the kitchen with a big kettle that always hung over the fire. Every day they lit the fire and added things to the pot. They ate mostly vegetables and did not get much meat. They would eat the stew for dinner, leaving leftover in the pot to get cold overnight and then start over the next day. Sometimes stew had food in it that had been there for quite a while. Hence the rhyme, Peas porridge hot, peas porridge cold, peas porridge in the pot nine day old.

Sometimes they could obtain pork, which made them feel quite special. When visitors came over, they would hang up their bacon to show off. It was a sign of wealth that a man could bring home the bacon. They would cut off a little to share with guests and would all sit around and chew the fat.

Houses had thatched roofs-thick straw-piled high, with no wood underneath. It was the only place for animals to get warm, so all the cats and other small animals (mice Bugs) lived in the roof when it rained. It became slippery and sometimes the animals would slip and fall off the roof. Hence the saying "It's raining cats and dogs.

There was nothing to stop things from falling into the house. This posed a real problem in the bedroom where bugs and other droppings could mess up you nice clean bed. Hence, a bed with big posts and a sheet hung over the top afforded some protection. That how canopy beds came into existence.



C HOUSEHOLD HINTS

INFORMATION ABOUT CLOTHES

DRYERS.. The heating unit went out on my dryer.

The gentleman that fixes thing around the house for us told us that he wanted to show us something and he went over to the dryer and pulled out the lint filter. which was clean. (I always clean the lint from the filter after every load clothes.) He told us that he wanted to show us something, he took the filter over to the sink, running water over it. The lint filter is made of a mesh material- I'm sure you know what your dryer's lint filter looks like. Well... the hot water just sat on top of the mesh and didn't go through it at all! He told us that dryer sheets cause a film over tht mesh and that's what burns out the heating unit. You can't see the film, but it's there Its what is in the dryer sheets to make your clothes soft and static free- that nice fragrance too, you know how they can feel waxy when you take them out of the box. Well this stuff builds up on your clothes and on your lint screen. This is what causes dryer units to catch fire and potentially burn your house down with that he said the best way to keep your dryer working for a long time (and to keep your electric bill lower) is to take that filter out and wash it with hot soapy water with an old toothbrush (or other brush) at least every six months. He said that makes the life of the dryer last at least twice as long P.S. I checked this out and he was right)







Wheeling

To many people the name means little more than a goo meal at one of the Milwaukee Avenue restaurants. Or an afternoon of browsing through antique shops again, on Milwaukee Avenue.

Ask some people how big Wheeling is, and they'll probably answer, "A few miles long and one street wide."

At one time those people would have been right.
Milwaukee Avenue, once the stagecoach route
between Chicago and Milwaukee, formed the spin
of Wheeling.

German restaurants sprouted along the road as did several hotels. The original village hall, a diminutive white frame building, was built on Milwaukee Avenue

But, if Milwaukee Avenue provide the spur to Wheeling's ambling growth 50 years ago, then Dunde Road is doing the same for Wheeling's growth today, for Wheeling has done its expansion west from Milwaukee Avenue along both sides of Dundee Road.

One has only to note the locations of the present and future village halls for evidence of this westward movement. At the moment village offices are at Dundee and Milwaukee Avenue.

Later this year, however, those offices will move to a new and larger village hall, also on Dundee Road, but much further west than the present one







It will be a long time before someone invents Something that will replace that "old-time apron" that served so many purposes.





6 eggs, separated, room temperature

1-1/4 cups sugar, divided Kitchen

1/3 cup orange juice

2 tablespoons grated orange peel

1-3/4 cups all-purpose flour

1/2 teaspoon salt

ORANGE GLAZE:

1 cup water

1/2 unpeeled orange, finely chopped

1/4 cup sugar

1 tablespoon butter

1/2 cup confectioners' sugar

In a mixing bowl, beat egg yolks until slightly thickened. Gradually add 3/4 cup sugar, beating until thick and lemon-colored. Blend in orange juice and peel. Sift together flour and salt: add to batter. Beat until smooth. In another mixing bowl, beat egg whites until soft peaks form.

Add the remaining sugar, 1 tablespoon at a time. Beat until stiff peaks form. Fold a fourth of the egg whites into the batter: fold in remaining whites. Spoon into an ungreased 10-in, tube pan; smooth the top. Bake at 350° for 40 minutes or until cake springs back when lightly touched. Immediately invert pan; cool completely. Meanwhile, for glaze, combine water, orange and sugar in a small saucepan: bring to a boil, Cook until very thick and almost all the water has evaporated. Remove from the heat; blend in butte confectioners' sugar. Run a knife around sides of cake and remove to a serving platter. Spread warm glaze over the top and sides of cake. Yield: 12-16 servings.







Town's 1st Settler Arrived In 1833

Wheeling Herald August 14, 1969 By Barb O'Reilley

The creamery made cheese, butter and ice cream, and it was the only source of dairy products in a wide area.

The first industry in the area was called "Uptadel's Pit." It manufactured cement blocks that were used in building many of the town's first structures.

Many of the buildings, such as Jensen's Ice Cream Parlor, are still standing today, and are in sturdy condition. (Note: remember this is August 14, 1969) The building was constructed by Albert Utpadel with cement blocks manufactured in the plant operated by the Utpadel family on their farm. The farm was adjacent to the land now occupied by Camp Dan Beard and used by the Boy Scouts.

The automobile brought families from the Chicago area to dine at the Milwaukee Road restaurants, which were famous for their German food. Electricity came to the village before World War 1.

THE TELEPHONE first came to Wheeling in 1898, when it was initially shown on the old Chicago Telephone Company's toll department map as a new toll station.

Sometime in 1901, exchange service began to be furnished for this town of 331 persons, and two switchboards were reported in use by the end of that year.

Milwaukee Avenue returned to prominence in the 1920's, with the highway paved from Chicago to Dundee Road. The Wheeling taverns along the highway were quite popular during prohibition, and quite a few gambling raids were made along the "Milwaukee Strip." as it was called After World War II, the 1950 Wheeling census showed 916 residents. In 1955, the subdivision building boom began with the building of Dunhurst subdivision. Keep up with the increased housing and residents, industry and commerce started growing, and Wheeling today has many shopping centers, including four large supermarkets. (Note: remember again this is 1969).







A Bit of History



Town's 1st Settler Arrived In 1833

Wheeling Herald August 14, 1969 By Barb O'Reilley

The town, by 1884, contained two general stores, three hotels, two blacksmith shops, one brewery, one physician, a Lutheran church, and about 200 citizens. Most of the residents of Wheeling were German-Alsatian

The townspeople found a need to incorporate in 1894 because of the "lawless strangers" who frequented the taverns located along Milwaukee Avenue, and because civic improvements were needed.

A petition was signed by 42 legal voters, requesting village incorporation. On June 19, 1894, a special election was held, with 43 votes for and three votes against a village organization.

A second election on July 17, gave Wheeling its first elected officials; Henry Boehmer, President; John Forke, Jacob Schwingel, Emil Sigwalt, Reinhold Schneider, William Fassbender, J.A. Schminke, Trustees; Louis Fischer, Police Magistrate; and W.R. Mundhenke, Village Clerk.

THREE WEEKS later the first village ordinance was passed, licensing the various hotels and dram shops which sold alcoholic beverages. The fee was set at \$500 per year, and with six applicants, the entire village budget was easily met.

At the turn of the century, Wheeling's 331 residents had a real community. Most people worked at the surrounding dairy farms. Entertainment consisted of local band concerts and Saturday night picnics.

The farmers delivered their milk by horse and wagon each morning to the Henry Boehmer Creamery, located on the lot now occupied by the Wheeling Farms Produce Store 444 E. Dundee. Local residents could buy bulk milk in pails with slip covers by walking to the dairy.



A Chicago Firehouse: Stories of Wrigleyville's Engine 78 is the story of Chicago's firehouse across from Wrigley Field (home of the Chicago Cubs!), and the diverse neighborhood she share. 

A Bit of History



Town's 1st Settler Arrived In 1833

Wheeling Herald August 14, 1969 By Barb O'Reilley

Wheeling's history goes back much further than 1894, when it became incorporated into a village. In fact, the first settlers in the Wheeling area arrived about 60 years before then.

The first settler in Wheeling Township was a Mr. Sweet, who arrive in March, 1833. However, by present village boundaries, Wheeling's first resident was Joseph Filkins, who staked his claim in 1834 on what is now the corner of Milwaukee Avenue and Route 68.

Filkins moved his family to Wheeling a year later. In 1836, he became the postmaster of the first Wheeling Post Office, the following year he opened a hotel.

WHEELING'S building boom came with the construction in 1835 of Milwaukee Road, now Milwaukee Avenue, which was the first mail and stage coach route between Chicago and Green Bay.

In 1837 a store was operated by Charles Daniels and Russell Wheeler. In 1838 there were two blacksmith shops, and shortly thereafter, a second hotel, two additional stores, a third blacksmith shop and a public school erected in 1845.



The Wheeling Post Office was established May 1, 1837 and was located in Filkins Tavern on the northwest comer of Milwaukee and Dundee roads until 1886. Owner Joseph Filkins served as postmaster during this time. This building was Wheeling's first tavern, hotel and stage coach stop.

The village of Wheeling was organized April 2, 1850. The first elections took place at the hotel of James Parker and Wheeling's Precinct I became the first voting area in the township.

The first place of worship, the Congregational Church, was bu9ilt in 1866. It had been organized, however, before the Civil War ended.





A Bit of History



Wheeling Post Office Grows From one in 1837 to 100 People in 1994.

The Wheeling Post Office had its beginning along with many other businesses in the Wheeling area a long, long time ago

The post office was established on May I, 1837 by Joseph Filkins. It was run out of Filkin's tavern on the northwest corner of Milwaukee Avenue and Dundee Road. This building was Wheeling's first tavern, hotel and stage coach stop. Mr. Filkins serves as postmaster...

In between 1837 and 1886, there was six different Postmasters: Charles Daniel, J.L. McDuffy, John Schaeffer, Charles Vogt, who served the longest term of 24 years, Fred Stryker, and Charles Hunsinger.

In 1896, Emil Sigwalt was appointed postmaster, and the post office wqas moved to the general store owned by Sigwalt and Christ Bollenbach, on the west side of South Milwaukee Ave. Call boxes were used, since there were no locks at that time.

In 1918, Ed Welflin took over as postmaster until 1934.

August Grewe was postmaster from 1937 until 1954. The post office was located in the Fassbender store, near the southwest corner of Milwaukee Ave. and Dundee Road. The post office was located in the store from 1934 until 1941. Around this time, air mail was beginning to be flown out of Pal-Waukee Airport. In 1941, the post office was moved to the Forke building, a few doors south, until 1957.

In 1970, the post office was moved to its present location at 250 West Dundee Road. The current postmaster was Terry Caldwell who has been in this position since March of 1993. The post office currently operates with about 100 employees.

1 package (1/4 ounce) active dry yeast

1/4 cup warm water (110° to 115°)

1 cup warm milk (110° to 115°)

1/4 cup shortening

1/4 cup sugar

1 teaspoon salt

1 egg, lightly beaten

3-1/2 to 3-3/4 cups all-purpose flour FILLING:

1 cup sugar

1/2 cup butter or margarine, softened

2 tablespoons grated orange peel

GLAZE:

1 cup confectioners' sugar

4 teaspoons butter or margarine, softened

4 to 5 teaspoons milk

1/2 teaspoon lemon extract

In a small bowl, dissolve yeast in water, in a large mixing bowl, mix milk, shortening, sugar, salt and egg. Add yeast mixture and blend. Stir in enough flour to form a soft dough. Knead on a lightly floured surface until smooth and elastic, about 6-8 minutes. Place in a greased bowl, turning once to grease top. Cover and let rise in a warm place until doubled, about 1 hour. Punch dough down; divide in half. Roll each half into a 15-in. x 10-in. rectangle. Mix filling ingredients until smooth. Spread half the filling on each rectangle. Roll up, jelly-roll style, starting with a long end. Cut each into 15 rolls. Place in two greased 11-in. x 7-in. x 2-in. baking pans. Cover and let rise until doubled, about 45 minutes. Bake at 375° for 20-25 minutes or until lightly browned. Mix glaze ingredients; spread over warm rolls. Yield: 30 rolls.



Hope to see you at the next meeting September 24th



A Bit of History



Pal-Waukee Airport Shows Its Flying Colors Through Its History

Pal-Waukee Municipal Airport offers a key into American history. As the country changed, so did the airport. Flying began with a Wheeling resident named Charles D. Balling. He and a friend from flight school, Les Rodda, purchased a Lincoln Paige 3 seater plane. Charles flew passengers out of a field they rented from Frank Haber located at Deerfield Road and Milwaukee Ave. (Which is now the Pekara subdivision.)

They called it Wheeling Airport. However, their Business soon ended when while taking a friend up for a lesson the plane crashed and was totaled. Luckily, no one was hurt.

In 1926, Wynn Bradford began the development of Pal-Waukee Airport along Palatine Road and about 200 feet west of Milwaukee Ave. The field was owned by Frank and Pete Barchard. Bradford stayed there for two years as a flight instructor and then he went to American Airlines.

According to Marshall Balling, Charles brother, it was a very popular thing in the late '20s and early '30s to line up along Palatine Road and Milwaukee Ave. to watch the planes take-off and land. Also at that time, many people took their first plane ride at Pal-Waukee for only a few dollars with one of the professional pilots.

In 1933, during the Century of Progress Exposition, a Goodyear blimp was kept at Pal-Waukee for the duration of the World's fair. People would be brought up from Miegs field downtown to see it. The hanger was located across from where the 94th Aero Squadron Restaurant is located today.

During the World War II years, a flight training program walled Civilian Pilot Training (CPT) was happening. During this time, many women were learning to fly. Esther Noffke, a former pilot at Pal-Waukee airport, was a Woman Air Force Pilot (WASP) during 1944 and 1945. When the WASPs were deactivated, she came to Wheeling.

Owen Jones was the owner of the airport at the time Noffke was a pilot. In 1946, he sold it to Parks Aircraft of East St. Louis. The airport was then sold again in 1953 to George Priester.

At this time, technology was advancing rapidly at Pal-Waukec. They erected 70 individual T-hangers, they put in a center field runway which was later converted to a taxi-way after they put in the dual runway system. Along with the land changes came new planes. Businesses such as the Wrigley Company and King Korn Stamp Company kept their DC-3s and B-25s at Pal-Waukee.

As the Sixties came along so did the Lear Jet, many new motels in the Wheeling Area and a new control tower for the airport.

In 1986, the City of Prospect Heights and the Village of Wheeling purchased the airport.






and bring your friends Everyone is welcome. This is a free program and refreshments will be served. A brief business meeting will follow the presentation.



When the program first began, children in grades one through three would go to the center every other week, either all morning or all afternoon, and learn about science "hands-on". Currently the intermediate grades are involved in the Discover Center program, Fergus said. "Teachers are specially trained to teach at the center," said Myers.

Of course, some of the most dramatic changes to the schools has come with the boom in computer and electronic technology advances, which has completely changed the way students have access to information.

"Students can hook up phones to access data lines all over the world," said Myers. A recent event in a kindergarten class demonstrates the students' capabilities. The kids wanted to learn about the state of Hawaii, the climate, way of life, etc. They contacted, via computer another kindergarten class in Hawaii and were transmitted letters from the kids that explained all about Hawaii, from their perspective.

Speaking of accessing information, school libraries aren't quite what they used to be either. "The library systems are not just a place to keep books any more," said Myers. "They are a repository for all kinds of electronic information, as well, "he said.

From buildings to books to computers, District 21 has risen to the challenge of meeting the changing needs of students in the 1990's.



2 cups all-purpose flour

1/2 teaspoon salt

2 cups chopped walnuts

2 squares (1 ounce each) unsweetened chocolate, melted FROSTING:

5 tablespoons all-purpose flour

1 cup milk

1 cup butter, softened

1 cup confectioners' sugar

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

In a mixing bowl, cream butter and sugar. Beat in eggs and vanilla. Add flour and salt; mix well. Fold in walnuts. Spread half of the batter into a greased 13-in. x 9-in. x 2-in. baking pan. Add chocolate to the remaining batter; mix well. Ca fully spread over batter in pan. Bake at 350 for 30-35 mitutes or until cake tests done. Cool completely.

For frosting, mix flour and milk in a saucepan. Cook and stir over medium heat until a thick paste forms, about 10 minutes. Cool completely. In a mixing

bowl, cream butter and confectioners' sugar. Add vanilla and mix well. Gradually add the milk mixture; beat for 5 minutes. Frost cake. Store in the refrigerator. Yield: 20-24 servings.

long with changes in buildings came changes in teaching and learning processes, explains William Myers, Assistant Superintendent for Instruction at District 21 "Its no longer the bell rings, the door closes, and the teacher starts teaching. Teachers work with kids as teams. kids aren't all in their separate cubicles. They're put together with kids of other age groups so they hear different ideas and thinking processes and they work on different projects," said Myers.

Myers likes to call the teachers "empowered work teams", as team planning with teachers has been incorporated into the system

Other things that have changed over the years, says Meyers, are the math programs in the schools "We've incorporated hands-on math programs and promote more problem-solving skills," he said

One of the schools in District 21 that was closed due to enrollment decreases a number of years ago was Hawthorne School. This school is now being used as the Discover Center, a "hands-on" science program that has been used in the schools for the past four years, explains Terri Fergus, Secretary to the Superintendent.




Hello from your new President! It is now June and with the flowers blooming and everything green, summer is finally here. It is really nice after such a long winter

"Dramatic changes," are the words Assistant Superintendent for Instruction William Myers uses when describing Wheeling schools then and now. Including building structures and learning environments. But before we get in to now, let's go back a few years.

Wheeling's school days, as far as buildings go, began in the year 1845. This first school building was soon outgrown, thus a new building was erected in 1861. Named "Wheeling School", it was located in a frame building on the south side of Dundee Road, west of Milwaukee Avenue.

Adeline Schneider reflects on the school in the book "Wheeling Through the Years" by the Wheeling Historical Society, "We walked to Wheeling Schwhich was just two blocks south and around the corner. Many times the bigger boys would ring the bell. Every once in a while they"d pull too hard on the rope, and the bell would tip and somebody would have to crawl up on the roof and get it back," she said.

In the same book, Frances Gerschefske Moeller, who was born on a farm on Portwine Road in 1905, recalls her school days at Wheeling School..."We lived on Portwine Road and I walked a mile and a half to school. There were no school buses in those days. Sometimes in winter we wouldn't even get home. I stayed over with my aunt and uncle, Mr. And Mrs. Kroll, on Dundee Road." She says. "We had to pump our own water and the teachers had to build the fires and clean." said Moeller.

Nine years later the school burned down and was rebuilt the following year, in 1871. The new school had two stories and was used until 192 when a new brick school building was constructed on South Wille St.

This structure was later incorporated in what is now Walt Whitman School that is, was Walt Whitman School.

I feel we have had a fairly successful year as Lollipop Lane and our dinner/auction was well received. Our picnic and social was not held this year mostly because of weather.



For Billy Moss, a history buff as well as restaurateur owning Wheeling's old Union Hotel and converting it to Billy and Company, 124 S. Milwaukee Avenue was the fulfillment of a 10 year dream.

"I had my eye on that building for 10 years before I bought it four years ago," he says, but Moss said he also was taking a "hard facts view of the situation." "In the western suburbs people are house poor, and Wheeling is easily accessible from all the North Shore and northwestern suburbs."

A more recent Wheeling entrepreneur was Bob Chinn, who opened his Crabhouse Restaurant, 393 S. Milwaukee Avenue, in 1983 in the former Hartmann House hotel.

"During the recession a series of restaurants in the area failed," he said. "The building was available at a good price." Chinn said he chose a suburb rather than Chicago to avoid high rents and security risks in the city.

Owners of the more expensive restaurants say most of their patrons come from other suburbs, particular ly the North Shore, while the family and short order restaurants cater to local residents.

George Kastanis says he opened Granny Anny's, 831 W. Dundee Road, three years ago because there were few restaurants on the west side of Whee The pancake house, which doesn't have a liquol license, caters to families and children, he says. "We have a good ethnic variety—Italian, German, Cantonese that runs the budget gamut as well," Pollack says.

Three restaurants have opened in the last year, the says. They are Il Nido's, 600 S. Milwaukee and My Pi, 102 S. Milwaukee

"The more restaurants, the more people come into town" Pollack says. "There is good cooperation among the restaurateurs too. If one is full, the chances are that one down the street isn't."







Some restaurants became known as hangouts for particular groups, Balling says. Chicago Cubs players congregated at Wenzlaff's, and the Relic House was a gathering place for Chicago theater people. Both those restaurants are defunct.

In the 1950s, a building boom in the northwestern suburbs stimulated the restaurant business. Developers and construction crews were often seen among restaurant clientele.

The old restaurant families began dying out during the latter half of this century, and most of the restaurants changed hands, some several times. Several current owners have expanded or moved from restaurants in Chicago and other suburbs.



For example James Masterson Jr. opened Hackey's in Wheeling, 241 S. Milwaukee, in 1965 because he wanted to add a third restaurant to the two he owned in Glenview. He bought an old house which he tore down, and built a restaurant in the style of the old Wheeling Homes. His family-style restaurant specializing in the "Hackney burger" with a loaf of onion rings, has been doing business ever since.

Don Roth, owner of Chicago's former Blackawk Restaurant, expanded to Wheeling in 1969 to try out a new concept of an open hearth grill with salad bar. He bought out a failing restaurant and implemented his idea, using students from nearby colleges as waitresses and busboys. Since then, Don Roth's Restaurant in Wheeling, 61 N. Milwaukee, has varieties of beef and seafood but still has the salad bar.

One of Wheeling's more famous restaurants, Hans' Bavarian Lodge, 931 N. Milwaukee, was opened seven years ago by the late John Berghoff, a former owner Chicago's Berghoff Restaurant, 17 W. Adams St. The lodge, specializing in German food, now is operated by Berghoff's widow Jane

"Wheeling had a good reputation for restaurants, she says. "There is a lot of traffic on Milwaukee Avenue. Customers seem to gravitate to the area. Perhaps the most elegant of Wheeling's restaurants, LeFrancais, 268 S. Milwaukee, was opened in 1973 by Jean Banchet, who had worked as chef in several Chicago restaurants.

"I was looking for a restaurant in the suburbs because I like the countryside," Blanchet says. "I really didn't believe I would be this successful." Le Français is one of four world-class French restaurants in the Chicago area.

"But hotels (for lodging) never were a big thing," says Marshall Balling, a local historian and Wheeling resident since 1915. "There wasn't really much to attract people to stay overnight.

With the coming of the automobile, however, hotel and road house businesses expanded to include gasoline and service for cars. "I remember when the Union Hotel had a sign out front that said "Auto Station No.1," Balling says.

By 1920, restaurants, most of them run by local families, had sprung up all along Milwaukee Avenue on either side of the Dundee Road intersection. Many served German food, reflecting the ethnic makeup of the neighborhood.

"From 1920 to 1940 was the heyday of Wheeling's restaurant business," Balling says. "Wheeling was a little away from the North Shore, which was a little too staid regarding liquor. In the 1930's, Wheeling had a population of only about 300 and 17 liquor licenses (an unusually high number for a town that size)."

Wheeling's population now is more than 24,000 according to 1980 census figures and estimates from building permits issued since the census, has 29 liquor licenses.

During prohibition, most of the restaurants were said to be speakeasies, some with considerable mob activity, especially in the operation of slot machines, Balling says.

"I remember the raids on some of the restaurants by the Cook County Sheriff's police," he says. "I think all the restaurants were speakeasies even those that specialized in home-cooked chicken dinners.



Marilyn is working on sending more information of the Grant family with pictures to Roxanne Stec (nee) Grant.


Patti is creating a picture collage of newspaper articles with picture for the Wheeling Masonic Lodge.

For more than 100 years, Wheeling has been known as a good place to get a good meal.

Today, more than 30 restaurants serve up everything from French gourmet to pizza. You can spend \$150 for dinner for two at Le Francais or about \$2 for a burger at McDonald's. Or, somewhere in between, you can spend \$10 to \$20 for a steak or seafood at Billy and Company, or \$3.50 to \$11 for "family style" at Hackney's.

Like Brookfield's zoo, Wheeling's restaurants are the main attraction of the community.

"The restaurants really are what has put Wheeling on the map," says Jack ie Pollack, executive manager of the Wheeling Chamber of Commerce. "They are a fine tradition that continues today. People are willing to travel here from other suburbs because of the quality" of the restaurants.

Wheeling's restaurant tradition actually is closely linked to travel.... The horse and buggy travel of the late 1800s between Chicago and Milwaukee or the resort lakes of southern Wisconsin. A small community of Wheeling at the crossroads of Milwaukee Avenue and Dundee Road was about half way to Wisconsin on the Milwaukee Avenue route.

Road houses, where travelers could rest and eat a midday meal, sprang up. Most began in private homes where offering home cooked meals to travelers became a farm family's means of earning extra money.

In the early 1900s, Wheeling had three hotels along Milwaukee Avenue—Union Hotel, the Hartmann House and the Chicago House, each of which offered a few rooms for lodging in addition to meals.





Companies and other groups can schedule golf tournaments and outings at Chevy Chase Golf Course. Group and private lessons are offered. The facility also has an indoor range.

With 18 preschool programs, the five new offerings this spring are Movement, Mom and Me, for developing motor skills; Snack-N-Time, where tots create snacks; Lil' Scientist, with science activities; Peanut Picassos, an art class; and Spring Crafts-N-Fun Preschool Workshop, a half day preschool.

Young people can participate in the 35 youth programs scheduled this spring, such as karate, soccer, cheerleading, cooking, music and dance class; Great Getaways, a trip to the Swallow Cliff Toboggan Shoots; general open ice skating at Chamber Park, and teen open gym for 6th through 9th graders.

"Our philosophy is that it's not just the best children who play," Phillips says. "We stress that everybody plays and that really make a dynamic youth program.

New this summer will be a soccer workshop directed by members of the Chicago Sting, to be held during the third week in August, according to soccer coach Gary Dobbe. Also new will be outdoor soccer for 7,8 and 9 year olds this summer.

Among the 47 adult programs are senior citizens activities, skiing, weight training, calligraphy, basic auto mechanics and fitness classes. 

Jim Landberg, great great grandson of James Parker, and great great grandson of his daughter Francis Parker, of Wheeling Village.

While working in the museum, I ran across a letter dated 1988 from Mr. John Sicks (living in Normal Illinois and former owner of the Carriage House), to Mr. Bob McIntyre giving him some of his family's history and I noted that his father Mr. George Sicks was president of the Village of Wheeling in 1917-1919.

As I had previously be working on a gallery of pictures of the village's former and present presidents, I called my sister Jane who lives in Normal and asked her to check and see if the Sicks still live there. She called back and advised that Mr. Sicks has passed away but his wife and family still reside there. She talked to Mrs. Sicks and related what I told her. Mrs. Sicks said she would check and see if there was a picture of George Sicks when he was president, but feared most of the old picture were thrown away by his wife. She told Jane when we come down to visit she would like to see us.

I then followed up with a letter of request and we did make a trip to Normal, last weekend. It was an interesting visit with Mrs. Sicks and her son. They had left Wheeling in about 1957 and showed pictures of the old church when it stood on Dundee Road. There were many other interesting things she told us but I would like to include most of Mr. Sicks letter which you will find of great interest.

"My grandmother's maiden name was Volz. She arrived in America in 1854 along with her parents, her grandfather, several aunts, uncles and cousins from Germany. They had been on the losing political side in the 1848 revolutionary period that involved several of the Germanic principalities They left homes and businesses in what they called Rhine Prussia to come to the U.S. My great-grandfather bought a farm near Deerfield. Some went to Arlington Heights to start a furniture business. Still other settled in what is now Northbrook.

My grandfather, Nickolaus Sicks, who had known the Volz family in Germany, came to America with them. In a few years he and ani Katarina Volz were married. Soon thereafter Nickolaus returned to Germany for a visit. The ship on which he was returning to the States after his visit, burned at sea. Nickolaus and other passengers spent two weeks in an open lifeboat before they were rescued. As a result, he contracted tuberculosis and in a few years the children. George, Carrie and John, lost their father. This was 1868.

Grandmother, her father and the children remained on the Deerfield farm until they built the Wheeling house. in the

early 1890's. During the years between 1892 and 1958 members of five generations lived there. My grandmother Sicks, her uncle Jacob Volz, who operated an inn on Milwaukee Avenue at Dundee Road, my father, his sister and brother. That's three generaltions, My father married Fredericka Reich of Iowa in 1915. I was born there in 1916 and between 1946 and 1958, my my mother, my wife and I lived in the house. It also became the home of our twin sons, in 1947 and our daughter in 1957.

As you know, Wheeling was essentially a retired farmer's town with several German restaurants and inns. The town population was about 300. The Sicks family was involved in establishing "Wheeling's one church", Zion Presbyterian built in 1865. Much later my father George was an Elder, Aunt Carrie was involved in all chuch activities and my mother "Ricca" was president of the Ladies' Aid Society, althernating in that office with Mrs. Charles (Minnie) Balling for more than 30 years.

George, in addition to being mayor for a time, was a village board member and for many years, the Justice of the Peace. He took this very seriously. The library in the old house was filled with law books. In that room, even though he was not a lawyer, he saw many people who came to him for legal advice. This was in addition to his duties as Justice of the Peace..a form of court. Dad was a quiet but very effective man and greatly respected. He died when I was only eleven. I wish I had known him better.

The Volz family is very much in evidence in the displays of the Arlington Heights Historical Society, particularly Albert F. Volz who served in the state legislature for several terms and was a lifetime Republican leader in Cook County.

After my father's death in 1927, my mother and I lived in the house which she had converted into a "two-flat". After World War II, I met and was lucky enough to marry Colette Meyer and she, too, came to love the old house which we again remodeled. We moved to Barrington after my mother's death in 1957.

About the barn, (Carriage House), it was built to accommodate two horses in the east half, had a hayloft and a room for buggies etc, in the western half.

Wheeling sort of forgot to grow until after World War II. It was a great place to be a kid. There were farms nearby, the river and the gravel pit. All terrific places to play and get in trouble. This was still true during the first 10 years of our son's lives."


