Edgewood Drive Sanitary Problem Discussed

The village board in a special meeting last week discussed what it thought might be the solution to the Edgewood drive sanitary problem.

The board has, for some time, heard complaints from residents of that district on the failure of septic tanks to operate properly. Exposed sewage in that area has repeatedly failed to be absorbed by the ground.

At the last regular village board meeting, John Grunst, chairman of the health committee suggested that a percolation test be made to determine if the ground along Edgewood drive is capable of absorbing the sewage. The complaint was then referred to the city engineer for investigation.

During the special board meeting last week, it was reported by Jim Gaston that it would not be feasible to tile the properties concerned because of physical difficulties.

He informed the board that Al Frank, Edgewood subdivider, would be willing to install sewers if the village gets an extended revenue assessment bond not to exceed \$10,000. Frank said he would buy the bonds or sell them for the village.

Frank was directed to have plans and specifications drawn up for approval by the village engineer. DeSoto McCabe and Associates is scheduled to draw up the specifications.

After those specifications are studied by the city engineer, he will report their feasibility to the village board with recommendations proceed, or not.

The village board will seek other solutions in the work.

The 10 point platform, the president said, resulted through the combined efforts of Civic Progress members to include in it pro-

and organizations who have the interest and welfare of Wheeling, insofar as residential, commercial and industrial matters are concerned; to encourage and strive for continued progress in Wheeling; and to promulgate and support programs of administration and government which will provide the taxpayer with thrift and economy.

PLATFORM:

1. Road Improvement
 - a) To install curbs, storm sewers, and resurface all arterial roads in Wheeling, so needed by utilization of monies from the motor fuel tax refund.
 - b) Conduct study of street lighting situation and draft plan for installation to be accomplished as funds are available.
2. Water
 - a) One of the major problems facing the residents today is not the lack of water, but the pump and distribution. We believe an immediate comprehensive study should be made with the objective of having a realistic solution presented. One that can be fulfilled and is within the reach, financially, of Wheeling.
 - b) To form a citizens group to analyze the study information for possible adjustments for presentation to the residents.
 - c) Action is needed and we propose to do something about it.
3. Industrial Development
 - a) To seek out desirable industry to locate in Wheeling, in
